Secrets of Home Canning

NO "ifs" about it — we've each got to do our share of home canning this summer. The health of the family next winter largely depends on it. A balanced diet of fruits and vegetables is absolutely necessary, and the supply of commercial canned goods is dwindling — already canned peas are one third less plentiful than a year ago, and the supply of canned beans is only about half.

Whatever method of canning you go in for — oven, water bath or pressure cooker — the secrets of success are the same: (1) Select food that's young and in its prime. Otherwise you're throwing away time and money. (2) Cut as short as possible the time between picking and canning, especially with vegetables. A good rule is two hours from vine to can.

(3) Limit yourself to ten or twelve quarts a day. That's particularly important when canning alkaline vegetables.

Stick to those rules. They reduce spoilage. So do these: Wash vegetables carefully, and that means remove all the dirt. Sterilize jars thoroughly. Don't use last year's rubbers. Be sure the lid is tight. Last, but certainly not least, after the food is canned, don't let it stand in the hot kitchen — get it down into the basement as fast as you can. And never store it in a kitchen cabinet.

How much should you can? I'm coming to that next week.

Creamed Chicken with Hard Cooked Eggs on Toast
Sliced Tomato on Lettuce
Chilled Grape Juice and Cookies

*Grape Juice Recipe
Wash sound ripe grapes. Cover with water and heat slowly to simmering. Do not boil. Cook slowly until fruit is very soft, then strain through a lint. Add ½ cup sugar to each quart of juice. Pour into sterilized jars, put on cap, process in water bath 30 minutes.
