

Cover Crop Seed Program for 1943 Ups Hairy Vetch

Substantial increases in the production of hairy vetch and common ryegrass, and about the same acreages of other cover crop seed crops as this year are objectives of the 1943 AAA seed purchase program, details of which have just been announced by the state office.

Growers will be offered the same prices for the same varieties of seeds as under this year's program, says N. C. Donaldson, executive assistant. A 50 per cent expansion in production of hairy vetch and common ryegrass is wanted to fill the needs of southern states' growers and of the British, who have asked for Oregon ryegrass seed to increase their livestock production.

Definite acreage goals have been established for Willamette vetch and Austrian winter peas, Donaldson said. Growers of these two crops are advised to contact their county AAA committees for individual farm goals, as only the production from the goal acreage will be eligible for sale to the government in 1943. Old growers, and growers wishing to change from wheat to seed production, will get first consideration in establishing farm goals for these two crops.

"Oregon farmers have made a substantial contribution to the war effort with this year's record production of cover crop seeds," Donaldson said. "Southern farmers, unable to obtain enough nitrate fertilizers, are dependent on cover crops to maintain production of war-needed food and fiber crops. Oregon, the principal source of supply, has sent south a veritable avalanche of this essential seed."

Hairy vetch is giving the best results in the southern states' cover crop program, reports indicate. This explains the request for a 50 per cent increase in production of that seed crop. Growers who expand plantings will be assured of a market. All hairy vetch grown by AAA cooperators may be sold to the government at prices based on 10 cents a pound for top grade, said Donaldson.

MARSHFIELD MAN FOUND DEAD UNDER AUTO

Pinned under the wreckage of an automobile for at least five days and possibly longer, the body of Maurice A. Maupin, 36, of Marshfield, was discovered late Thursday about two miles west of Camas, Valley on the Roseburg-Coos Bay highway. The car, which had slid off the highway and down an embankment to the creek bed, was seen last Monday, but was not reported and no investigation was made, E. L. McCurdy, deputy county coroner, stated. Two boys, Victor Standley, 15, and Norman Salice, 14, playing along the creek, discovered the body late yesterday evening. The body was completely hidden under the overturned car and could not be seen, McCurdy said, except from the creek bed.

McCurdy reported that the car's ignition had been switched off and that the keys were in Maupin's pocket. It was believed that the car had skidded off the road and poised on the edge of the embankment, and that in getting out of the machine Maupin caused it to become overbalanced and was carried with the automobile down the embankment.—Roseburg News-Review.

Motorists who have misplaced or lost their automobile registration cards were warned today by Richard G. Montgomery, state OPA director, that these cards will be necessary to obtain gasoline rationing certificates when national gas rationing starts next month.

Each motorist applying for a gasoline rationing certificate—and only one certificate will be issued for any automobile—must produce his registration card before the certificate will be issued.

Duplicate auto registration cards to replace those lost or misplaced, may be obtained, Montgomery said, from the motor vehicle division of the secretary of state's office in Salem or Portland.
