Marvin Harris left Tuesday to take his second examination preparatory to joining the armed forces.

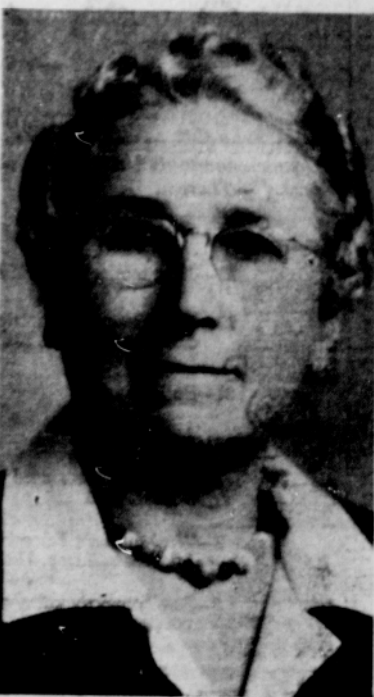
Mr. and Mrs. Cunningham and baby of San Francisco have moved into the A. A. Hull house. Mr. Cunningham is employed at the Woodard mill.
