

Oil Employees Are Urged to Stay On Present Jobs

Local representatives of the petroleum industry recently received copies of a joint statement by Paul V. McNutt, chairman of the War Manpower Commission, and Harold L. Ickes, Petroleum Administrator for war, urging men now engaged in the petroleum industry to remain with their present jobs, in order to serve the war interest.

The statement followed reports that oil company employees in some instances had recently quit to go to work in shipyards and other war industries, in the belief that the government wanted them to do so.

This loss of manpower in the oil industry was said by local representatives today to threaten impairment of vital war work in this and other areas.

The McNutt-Ickes statement follows, in part:

"Reports are being received in Washington from a few places to the effect that oil company employees misunderstand the war manpower commission's recent statement about non-deferrable occupations.

"The reports are that oil, natural gas and gasoline company employees engaged in vital and essential jobs in that industry failed to report for work and instead were seeking employment in munitions plants or some other kind of work which they thought was listed as more essential by the war manpower commission.

"Petroleum is regarded as one of the most essential of war industries and has been so designated previously by the war manpower commission.

"Oil and natural gas are vital to this war and it does not help to win the war for men who have long been trained and skilled in this industry to leave their present jobs. We wish to emphasize that while planes, tanks and ships fight the battles, they cannot fight without oil to fuel them. The production, refining, transportation and distribution of oil and gas are all necessary.

"The same principle applies to other essential industries and to the countless services of civilian supply. Any man who reads the limited list of activities covered by the recent WMC order will see that it is merely directed at things which either (a) can be done without for the duration of the war, or (b) can be performed by women, older or handicapped workers, or by unskilled workers."

WASHINGTON—The office of price administration Saturday removed all rationing restrictions on recapping of passenger car and light truck tires.

Tires may now be recapped with reclaimed rubber, the OPA said, without restriction. This is a measure to save rubber by extending the life of tires already in use.

Rubber Director William M. Jeffers has fully approved the plan, the OPA said. However, it was pointed out the measure in no way relaxes rubber conservation measures such as the restriction of mileage through gasoline rationing, the 35-mile an hour speed limit and tire inspection.

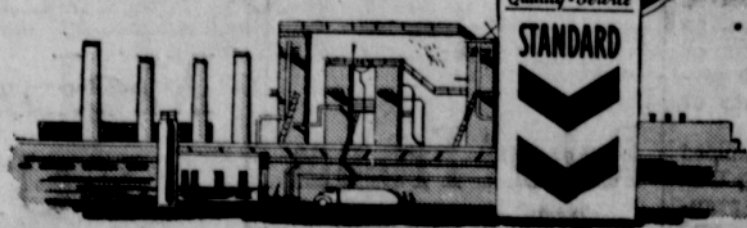
