Saving on Points

Every homemaker knows that food is a weapon of war—that our fighting men and our allies must have food just as Flying Fortresses must have bombs. Every week we are sending shiploads of canned goods—we at home will share all that is left. New ways of managing the limited foods are in prospect and, as a starter toward getting money's worth and coupon's worth of point-rationalized foods, here are a few tips from the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Keep in mind the nutrition yardstick and make point-rationalized foods fit into the planning of balanced meals. Don't duplicate what you can buy fresh. What you eat fresh takes the pressure off processed foods. Read the label for all it can tell about quantity, quality, ingredients, and use. Choose the size of can most economical for your use. Here is a table of equivalents that you may want to keep in your kitchen:

1 lb. (No. 1, tall)	2 3/4	3 to 4
1 lb. 4 oz. (No. 2)	2 1/2	4 to 5
1 lb. 12 oz. (No. 2 1/2)	3 1/2	5 to 7

1 pt., 2 fluid oz.	2 1/4	2 cups
1 pt., 4 fluid oz.	2 1/2	2 cups

In place of canned soups which require six points for each can, try making your own—for example, a cream of potato or a canned mixed vegetable soup—a grand way for using left over cooked vegetables; fish chowders; onion soup. All are flavorful and nutritious. This potato soup will furnish part of the recommended quart of milk daily for children and pint for adults, and won't require a coupon from your ration book.

Potato Soup	Cups	Servings
4 cups mashed potatoes	6	6 cups
6 cups milk	2	2 eggs, separated
1 tbsp butter		

1/2 tsp celery salt
1 tsp salt
Heat milk in double boiler. Mix potatoes, egg yolks, butter, celery salt and salt and add to hot milk; heat thoroughly. Serve in bouillon cups, topping each serving with beaten egg white and a dash of cinnamon. Serves eight.
