

State War Nurse Quota Set at 451

The sum of \$50,000 was set aside by the National Executive Committee of the American Legion Auxiliary at its January meeting, to be used in aiding women between the ages of 18 and 35 years of age, to enter nursing training or to complete a nursing training course. This is not a loan fund. Amounts up to \$250.00 will be given to student nurses already enrolled in a hospital school for nurses who find themselves lacking in funds that they would have to withdraw from school, and to young women having completed high school and whose character requirements have been approved and accepted by an accredited school of nursing, and who without financial aid, could not enter training to become a nurse.

There is now a bill before congress which would provide aid to those seeking nursing training in such amounts as to assist them to complete their courses. However it is anticipated this fund will not be available until around September 1. Our \$50,000 is to assist girls and women to start their course now.

You must take your training in an accredited school of nursing. There are ten of these schools in Oregon, five of which are in Portland. They are: Portland, St. Vincents, Good Samaritan, Emanuel, Multnomah County and Portland Sanitarium. (It has been advised that the last named accept Adventist girls only). Other Oregon hospitals are: Astoria, Pendleton, Baker, Eugene and The Dalles. All excepting the one at The Dalles are Sisters Hospitals.

It has been suggested that it would be well to train in a hospital which meets Red Cross requirements. Mrs. Linnie Laird, executive secretary, whose address is 205 Stevens Bldg., Portland, will be glad to give prospective students any advice or assistance.

To aid in the present emergency, 55,000 student nurses were sought by May 1 of this year. We are short 6,000 of this number. Oregon's quota of this 55,000 was 451. Only 321 enrolled. This was partly due to the fact that many women and girls did not have the finances to start such a course. Any amount allowed by the national committee will be an outright gift from the American Legion Auxiliary.

Application form may be obtained from Mrs. Alvis Wicks, local secretary, from State National Defense Chairman, Mrs. J. W. McInturf, Hall Bldg., Marshfield, or State Secretary, Mae Whitcomb, 4213 N. E. 28th St., Portland. Interested parties should act at once as it is anticipated that the fund will be used completely by August 1, and it is rather a case of first come, first served.

Should the girl making application require other funds than the amount which is given her from this fund, she can make application for assistance from the Department Scholarship Loan Fund for help, should she be the daughter of a member of the American Legion Auxiliary.

A girl or woman need have no connection with the American Legion Auxiliary. The whole procedure is very simple. The money is ready and is already being paid out. Simply choose an accredited school, enroll and make your application. The local Unit of the Auxiliary is aiding to finance this available fund.

FUEL OILS—Coupon 5, Zones A, B, and C, good through September 30.

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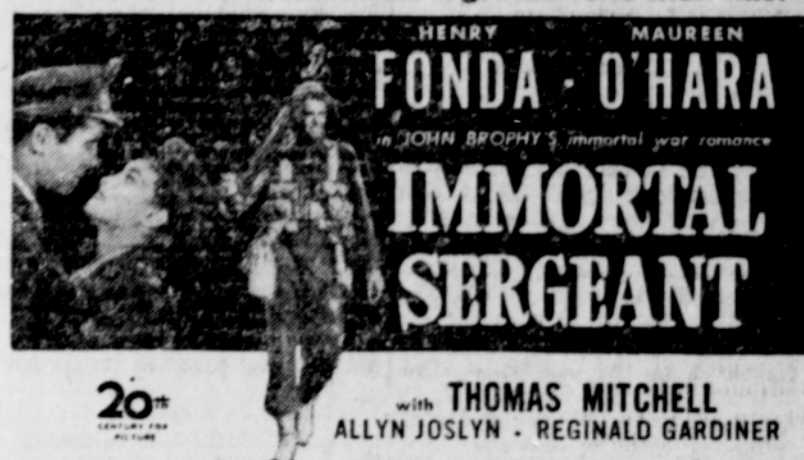
