Legion Poppies

How the memorial poppies which will be worn to honor the war dead on Poppy Day, May 29, will bring help to war's living victims was explained by Mrs. Warren Daugherty, treasurer of Calvin Funk Unit of the American Legion Auxiliary.

Mrs. Daugherty is one of the many volunteer workers who will distribute the poppies on the streets here that Saturday. She says:

"I hope everyone understands what becomes of the coins they contribute when they take a poppy from an Auxiliary worker. I wish everyone could know the need for those contributions, especially this year when the war is increasing that need so greatly.

"First, let me say that every penny of the money paid for poppies goes into rehabilitation and welfare work of the American Legion and Auxiliary, and because this work is performed by volunteers, it goes a long way.

"Disabled veterans and children left fatherless by war are the special concern of the Legion and Auxiliary. It is for them the poppy dimes and dollars are given, not so much for their material needs as for their human needs.

"Only the billions of the government can bring adequate relief to the nations disabled defenders and their families, but there are things which the government with all its billions cannot do. It cannot provide the understanding aid and personal attention that so often are such a big factor in a disabled man's rehabilitation; which so often hold his family together until he is able to return home.

"This the Legion and Auxiliary are doing with the help of the money you give on Poppy Day. By wearing a poppy you aid the disabled as well as honor the dead."

SOLDIERS GRAVES RECORDED

The burial place of American soldiers who fall on foreign soil will be properly recorded by the graves registration units of the U. S. army. This service operates closely behind the combat area, burying the dead, recording and marking the graves, and collecting personal effects. Except when combat interferences, overseas burials are approximately the same as those conducted in the United States with full military honors rendered. Rites are ministered by a chaplain of the deceased's own faith when possible.

Bus Official Advises Less Summer Driving

Repeating his advice to the traveling public not to do any long-distance traveling during the coming months, F. W. Ackerman, vice president of Pacific Greyhound Lines, in a statement to the press advises people to stay at home this summer and spend the money they would use for a trip to buy additional war bonds.

Acknowledging that this is unusual advice coming from a company whose business is to promote travel, Mr. Ackerman pointed out that winning the war is far more vital to everybody than taking week-end or vacation trips. Mr. Ackerman said that he fully agrees with the statement made by Mr. Eastman, director of the office of defense transportation, to the effect that there will be little room for vacation or pleasure travel this year, and added that buses are already crowded with military traffic war workers, and other passengers whose business is important to the nation's welfare.

Stating that while many war workers and others would undoubtedly benefit from a short vacation, Mr. Ackerman believes that they should relax at home, or near home, rather than take long trips. They should travel only during the middle of the week, get travel information in advance, and carry as little baggage as possible. This cooperation, he said, will help relieve the nation's over-taxed transportation facilities which are so vital to the prosecution of the war.
