THINGS TO COME

194x Car—Speculation is rife concerning the post-war automobile. Best bet is that it will not differ radically from the 1942 car, because manufacturers could convert to civilian production much more quickly by using their 1942 machine tools. Nevertheless, according to an article by Fran Jardine, Aluminum Company of America engineer, in the authoritative SAE Journal, most engineers agree that all post-war cars will be lighter than the same size pre-war cars. Only as a last resort will over-all size be reduced; lighter materials will be the first consideration. On a 3,000-pound car, use of 500 pounds of aluminum in practical applications would save 500 pounds, he writes. There will be new and stronger aluminum alloys for highly stressed parts, while improved secondary-type alloys, with better physical properties, will result from industry's wartime experience in learning to keep aluminum scrap clean and free from contamination.

Feeds, Predatory Animals Disturb Western Stockmen

Methods by which to eliminate at least some of the livestock feed shortages and to protect livestock against growing depredations of predatory animals were recommended by the Western Oregon Livestock association at its annual meeting in Albany recently. More use of grass and legume silage, better distribution of high protein concentrates, and the release of more ammunition for livestock men were among measures suggested.

The shortage of high protein feeds was especially noted by the association, which urged that the proper authorities investigate the present distribution method, as it appeared that ample supplies are available in the country if evenly distributed.

"One of the best methods to use in improving the quality and protein content of farm-grown feeds in western Oregon is for farmers to make grass and legume silage with molasses," one resolution stated. "The value of such feed has been clearly demonstrated to an increasing number of western Oregon farmers. This silage is generally made in the late spring and early summer months and requires from 50 to 75 pounds of stock molasses per ton."

One difficulty pointed out by the resolution is a WPB ruling that molasses can not be delivered in steel drums even though such drums are already owned by farmers.

The report of the wildlife and predatory animal committee recommended that trappers of the fish and wildlife service engaged in predatory animal control be classified as essential workers. The average loss of domestic livestock and poultry from predatory animal depredations is in excess of 5 per cent and is on the increase, the committee reported.

\$119,880.00 PAID IN BY SHELL

Announcement was made Saturday that \$119,880.00 has been paid to the Petroleum Industries War Council, Washington, D. C., by Shell Oil Company, Incorporated.

This amount represents the proceeds obtained from collection of 33,714,000 pounds of scrap rubber in the Pacific Coast area during the 1942 drive. The oil industry takes no profit as the entire amount will be distributed to the American Red Cross, U.S.O., Army Relief and Navy Relief.

UPPER SMITH RIVER ROAD TO BE IMPROVED

Federal assistance for two Douglas county roads, the Calapooia and Upper Smith River roads this year will amount to approximately \$120,000, it was announced Tuesday at Roseburg.
