

Feed Savings for Farmer-Consumer

Revision of the retailer's mark-up provisions of the price regulation on mixed feeds for animals and poultry, with substantial savings to the farmer-consumer, was announced Tuesday by the district OPA.

Previously, the retailer had been allowed a fixed mark-up of \$7.50 a ton on all kinds of feeds, without classification. Now, there is a schedule ranging from \$5.50 to \$10.00 a ton on all "cost-of-living" feeds.

Dairy feeds have a \$5.50 a ton mark-up. Hog feeds and laying mash for poultry have a \$7.00 per ton mark-up. Feeds for chicks have a mark-up of \$10.00. The estimated proportion of these three, in volume sold, is four for dairy feeds to two for hog feed and laying mash to one for chicks feeds.

Tuesday's action affects 50,000 retailers who sell to farmers all over the country. The new regulation becomes effective May 8.

In restating the control, the provision for maximum prices for the mineral mixed feed manufacturer has been completely rewritten.

Two classes of mineral mixed feed manufacturers are set up: A and B.

The class A manufacturer determines his maximum prices by his historical margins on sales to other than consumers on lots of less than 500 pounds and lots of more than 500 pounds. Other sellers buying from class A manufacturers determine their maximum prices to consumers under the section governing retailers in general.

The class B manufacturer determines his maximum prices on his historical margins on sales, and offers of sales, to consumers. All others selling mineral mixed feeds produced by a class B manufacturer have like maximum prices to consumers.

These changes were designed to make the regulation conform to past selling prices of mineral mixed feed, said OPA officials.

WAR BOND QUIZ

Q. Does an album filled with stamps automatically become a Bond that will mature in 10 years?

A. No. It must be exchanged for a Bond, and it will bear no interest until it is so exchanged.

Q. Can payment of a War Savings Bond be made to the receiver or trustee in bankruptcy of the estate of a registered owner?

A. Yes, when bankruptcy or insolvency has been adjudicated and request for payment has been duly executed.

Q. Can I authorize my employer to set aside portions of my salary each pay day until enough is accumulated to buy a War Savings Bond?

A. Yes, if your employer has installed a Pay-Roll Savings Plan. More than 24 million wage and salary earners are saving their money this way.

Q. Can I invest a lump sum in War Bonds and receive from the investment a return in the nature of an annuity?

A. No. The purchase of each War Savings Bond is a separate transaction. Each Bond is dated as of the first of the month in which payment for it is received by an authorized issuing agent, and matures exactly 10 years from that date.

Remember—the longer you keep War Bonds, up to 10 years, the more valuable they become.

Point Values Cut On Dried Soups

Following is the text of the OPA announcement of revised point values for processed foods at Washington.

In an emergency decision, made after the official point charts for May were printed, the Office of Price Administration May 2 temporarily removed from rationing all dried or dehydrated soups.

Simultaneously, OPA revealed the May point values for processed foods, highlighted by further substantial reductions in the number of points required to be paid for most fruit and vegetable juices.

The further lowering of point prices of most fruit and vegetable juices reflects a similar desire on the part of OPA to speed up their sales, which studies show to be lagging behind those of other fruits and vegetables.

Blue stamps lettered G, H and J, a total of 48 points, are valid for the month of May and, because of the latest revisions, will enable consumers to increase their purchases of several important types of canned foods, especially fruit juices.

There are no major changes in the point values of vegetables, except for reductions in tomato juice and other vegetable juice combinations containing 70 per cent or more of tomato juice.

Frozen fruits and vegetables continue to carry the same point values that were assigned to them on April 22. There are no changes in the point prices of dried beans, peas, and lentils or of baby foods.

GREATER CARE NEEDED IN PRODUCING EDIBLE PEAS

Greater control of the pea weevil and more care in handling and grading are necessary with the production of dry edible peas than with Austrian winter peas raised for seed, according to information brought out at a conference on harvesting, grading, and marketing problems of dry smooth edible peas, held by the Extension service at Oregon State college recently.

Oregon has planted upwards of 50,000 acres of such peas this year in response to a strong demand from the government for a heavy production of this crop for military, civilian, and lend-lease use. Experiences of Washington and Idaho growers, where these have been produced longer than in Oregon show that, if application of rotenone dust is carefully timed and if fields are accurately checked by sweeping to detect presence of the adult weevil, one application will reduce infestation

to a practical level. Any infested peas that do occur must later be removed in grading and cleaning. Arrangements have been made to obtain about 50 special pea reels and 40 cutter bars for combines in this state to be used in the edible pea harvest.
