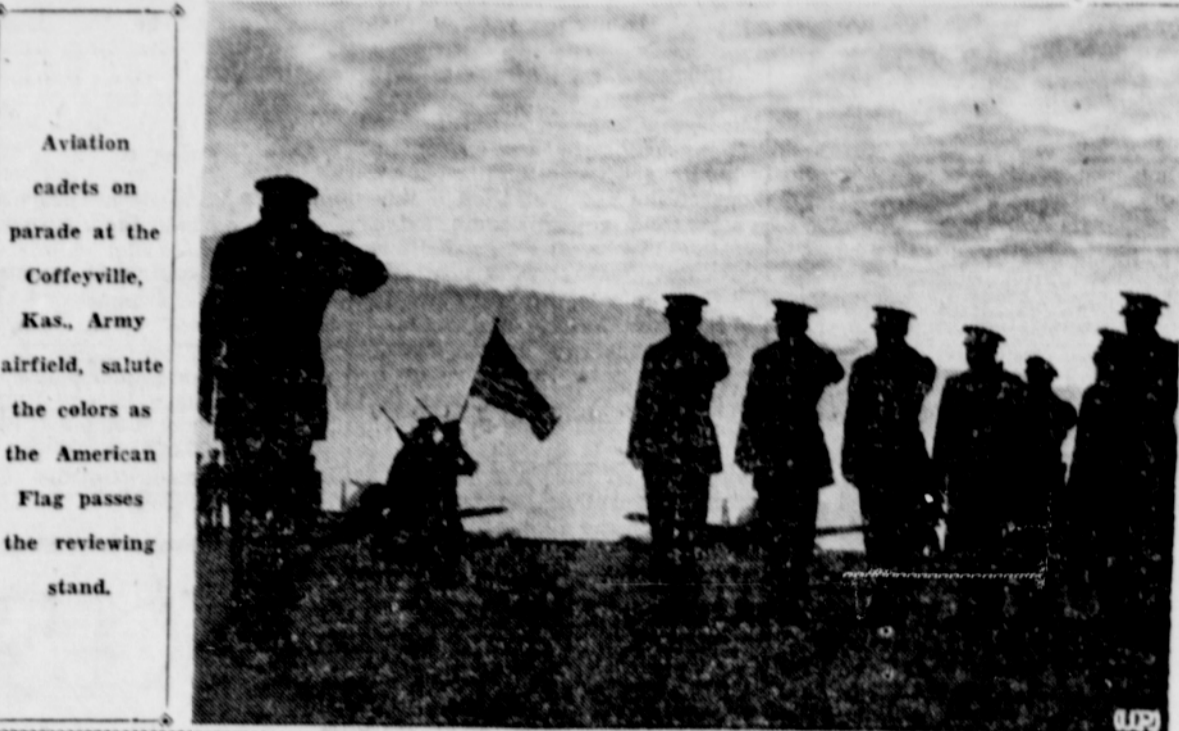

NEW BOOKS AND REPLACEMENTS AT LIBRARY

Very recent books and replacements of old favorites continue to arrive at the public library and are being placed upon the shelves as soon as they can be prepared, according to Mrs. Nellie Hamant, librarian. Some of the shelves at present seem quite vacant, but this is only during the process of rearranging the stacks. A good many very badly worn volumes have been discarded, and room is being left for expansion and addition of new books throughout the coming months.

In rearranging and moving the classifications the library board members have checked up on any lack in various sections. Realizing that during the strain and stress of wartime there is a call for more helpful religious books this division has received special planning and thought recently in ordering new books. With the intention of assisting Bible school teachers, students, ministers, or any citizens who desire this line of reading, many fine volumes have been added. These have been selected with the aid of the local ministerial association, and the advice of others well informed on these subjects.

On these shelves now will be found new volumes of the Bible, American Standard version (Nelson), Douay translation (Catholic) Moffat's translation. "The Bible designed to be read as living literature." A King James version, paraphrased as modern books. "Our Dwelling Place" by Seidenspinner and Larson, is a unique book for private worship. This volume is especially for those who would call upon the eye to stimulate the worshipping spirit. It is a combination of beautiful photographic pictures combined with selected devotional material appropriate to each picture. It will be a delight to anyone who takes time to look it over.

Other new books appearing this month are "A Guide to Understanding the Bible," Fosdick; "On Being a Real Person," Fosdick; Cruden's Complete Concordance; "Seeing the Multitudes," Stamm; ("A courageous and searching study of the Beautitudes of Jesus"). "Faith Under Fire" by Michael Coleman gives his answers to questions asked him in the air-raid shelters of London.

Many other books besides will be found on the religious shelves, and a lot of books with interesting reading are in the new stacks under the heading of Fiction, Biography, Science, War, Nutrition, Medical helps for the average citizen etc.

LONDON 4-H MOTHERS MEET

The London 4-H Mothers club met on Wednesday for their regular all day meeting at the old London hotel building. She asked members to cooperate with the American Legion drive for old or broken phonograph records, as requested by E. A. Danielson, county club agent.
