

### Federal Grading Of Eggs Modified

Some modifications of federal grades for eggs sold through retail channels have been made by the OPA in placing permanent price ceilings on market eggs, an explanation of which has just been received by County Agent O. S. Fletcher, from Noel L. Benion, extension poultryman at Oregon State college.

Grades provided for eggs sold at retail are AA, A, B, C, or assorted eggs. Assorted eggs are those which are edible but ungraded and which have a net weight of not less than 43 pounds per case and contain not more than 20 percent of dirty and unchecked eggs. These are required to be marked as such.

All eggs sold through retail channels with the exception of AA grade may be graded by the

producer, wholesaler, or retailer in compliance with new U. S. consumer standards, while any eggs sold as AA must have been inspected by a licensed federal inspector. All must be plainly marked as to grade and size.

The five sizes provided for under the OPA classification are jumbo, extra large, large, medium, and small. The minimum net weights per dozen of these are, respectively, 28 ounces, 26 ounces, 24 ounces, 21 ounces and 18 ounces. Some variation of individual eggs is allowed within these total weights. Thus, for the different grades individual eggs may be included which by the dozen would weigh not less than 27, 25, 23, 20, and 15 ounces.

County Agent Fletcher has further details on egg ceiling prices and the new U. S. consumer egg grades, or these may be obtained direct from the poultry department at Oregon State college.

### Fishing

Lane County — Angling conditions are improving in eastern Lane county, with water clearing and lower. There were some nice catches taken the last few days on the McKenzie river, which should improve this week end. Best results on the lower part of the river have been with fly, also spinner and bait. The smaller streams have not been very good the last few days. The Middle Fork of the Willamette in the vicinity of Oakridge has been only fair due to snow water. Fair catches have been reported from the North Fork of the Willamette.

In western Lane county, Lake creek and Deadwood are fair, with small spinner the best lure. Siuslaw river in tide water is good on troll, Doc Shelton and worms being the best lure. Ten Mile and Big Creeks are only fair, with eggs bringing the best results. Siltcoos lake is fair for trout on troll and perch fishing is good.

Douglas County—In the Roseburg district, owing to weather and stream conditions, trout fishing continues poor. A few trout are being taken, mostly on salmon eggs or spinner and worms as lure. The few parties who have hiked the 12 miles to Fish Lake above Camp Comfort report only fair success. Chinook salmon fishing in the North Umpqua river below Winchester has improved slightly the past week, but is not yet at its best.

In western Douglas county, due to high water, angling was reported very poor over the week end.

### CREAM OF VEGETABLE SOUP

- 3 tablespoons butter
  - 3 tablespoons minced onion
  - 3 tablespoons flour
  - 3 cups milk
  - 1 cup vegetable water or 1 cup milk
  - 2 teaspoons salt

  - 1 1/2 cups finely chopped cooked vegetables
  - Paprika

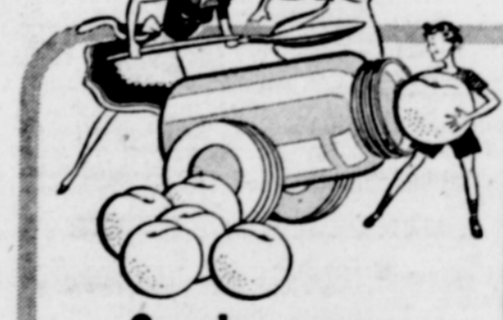

### Canning season just ahead

This year the legion of home canners will be far larger than ever before. And with the canning season just ahead, it's none too soon to start planning now for this food conservation event.

### Plan Your Canning Budget

Of course, the amount of home canning you do will depend upon the size of your family. It is just as wasteful to can too much as it is to pass up the canning season altogether. A fair allowance for the average person is 100 quarts of canned fruits and vegetables a year. This figure includes both home and commercially canned foods. Divide that 100 quarts in thirds, one-third for fruits and berries, one-third for tomatoes and tomato juice, and one-third for vegetables with a large portion in leafy and green vegetables, and you have a rough estimate of your family's needs for the year.

This allowance doesn't include jellies, pickles, relishes and those extras that pep up the menu the year around.

Assemble all your jars that can be used for sealing. Some mayonnaise and peanut butter jars and other jars can be used if they take the standard size self-sealing lids. Check the mouths of the jars and discard all those with chips, cracks, or flaws, for such defects make perfect sealing impossible. If you've half gallon jars, plan to use them for tomatoes and fruits. They are too large for the proper penetration of heat for other foods.

Be sure there's enough storage space for your canned goods before you plan too much canning, for if you haven't a place to keep them, don't can—foods will spoil! They should be stored in a dark, cool place. It is not wise to keep them in the kitchen because of the heat from cooking.

Include commercial pectins, pickling spices, paraffin, self-sealing lids and added canning jars on your preparatory shopping list, as well as anything else you may need.
