Gasoline: "A" book coupons No. 5, good for four gallons each, expire May 21 outside the eastern gasoline shortage area.

Sugar: Coupon No. 12 good for 5 lbs., must last through May 31. Coupons for sugar for home canning available at local ration boards on and after May 15.

Coffee: Stamp No. 23 (1 lb.) good through May 30.

Fuel Oil: Period 5 coupons valid in all zones until September 30.

Shoes: No. 17 stamp in war ration book one good for one pair through June 15.

Meats, Etc.: Red stamps E, F, G, H remain valid through May. Red stamp J becomes valid May 23.

Processed Foods: Blue stamps G, H, J remain valid through May.

FREE CLINIC FOR CHILDREN ENTERING SCHOOL

A physical examination clinic for all boys and girls entering the first grade next year will be held at the Jefferson school Friday, May 21, from 10 a. m. to 12 and from 1 p. m. to 3 p. m. Dr. C. R. Lingren, county health officer, and Mrs. Helen Morelock, school nurse, will be in charge.

Superintendent of Schools H. B. Ferrin has sent letters to parents who have entering students urging that their child have a complete physical examination by their own doctor or at the school clinic. It is a requirement of the local schools that all first grade school students have a physical examination before starting school. Only children who will be six years of age by November 15 will be eligible to begin school according to Oregon school law.
