

Final Details on Canning Sugar

Final details on how consumers will obtain sugar for home canning under a simplified plan were issued last week by the OPA.

According to the revised program, stamps numbered 15 and 16 in war ration book one will each be good for five pounds of sugar for home canning. Consumers will obtain this sugar by taking their ration books to retailers rather than applying to local boards for sugar coupons as was announced earlier.

Stamps 15 and 16 became valid on May 24, and may be used for obtaining canning sugar in amounts of 5 pounds on each stamp through October 31, 1943.

The change in the program for obtaining sugar for home canning to relieve local boards of a heavy load of work, since, under the new arrangement, only the relatively few families who require more than ten pounds of sugar per person for home canning will make application to the boards.

This amount of sugar, explained OPA, will put up as much fruit as most families will be able to can or intend to use. At the allowed rate of one pound of sugar to four quarts of finished fruit the ten-pound-per-person allowance would provide each person with 40 quarts of canned fruit.

Where home canners require less than 10 pounds of sugar but an amount other than 5 pounds, they will apply to their local boards for the exact amount needed. The application must be in writing and may be sent by mail.

No change has been made in the rate at which sugar for canning will be made available—one pound for each four quarts, or eight pounds per person for making jams and jellies—with a total not to exceed 25 pounds.

In exceptional cases where consumers require more than the ten pounds of canning sugar obtainable with sugar stamps in war ration book one, application for additional allotments may be made at local ration boards.

Application to the boards must be in writing—one application per family unit—and may be mailed or presented in person. Each application must be accompanied by ration book one for any person for whom application is made, and should, in addition, provide boards with the following information:

1. The number of quarts (or pounds) of processed foods the applicant and members of his family unit have produced since March 1 of this year with sugar already obtained for home canning, either with stamps in war ration book one, or by previous application to the board.
2. The amount of sugar on hand for home canning.
3. The amount of sugar that has been obtained for making jams and jellies.
4. A statement that all sugar obtained for home canning will be used for this purpose, and at the prescribed rate—an average of one pound for four quarts, (or eight pounds) of finished fruit, and five pounds per person for jellies and jams.)
5. Any other information the board may require.

Boards will issue sugar canning coupons or certificates for ten pounds less than the total requirement (10 pounds may be bought with stamps in war ration book one)—and will record on the cover of each person's ration book the amount and date of sugar allotted.

If application is made after October 31 (the date on which stamps 15 and 16 in the sugar book expire)—and no sugar has been previously granted, or bought with stamps 15 and 16, boards may issue coupons for the full canning requirements—in no case more than 25 pounds per person.

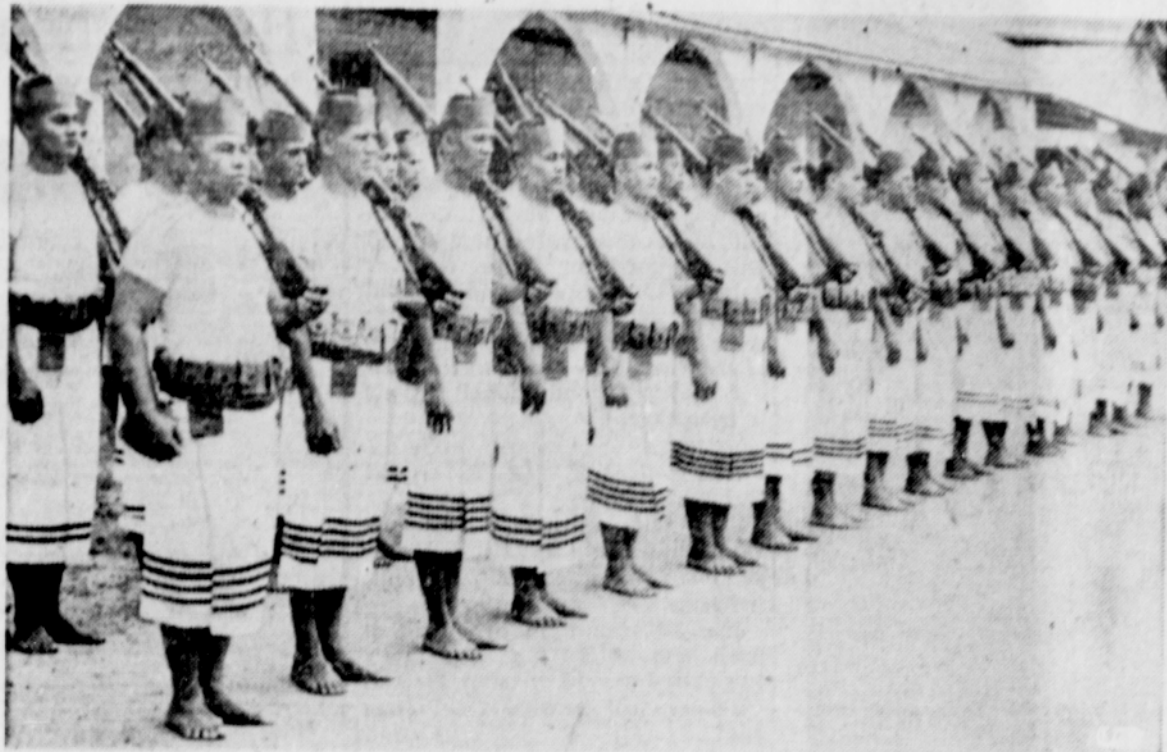
