WAVE SPAR RECRUITING CRUISER

Young women in this area who are interested in the WAVES or SPARS, women's reserve units of the United States Navy, will have an opportunity to get complete information on both branches of the service when the Navy's Recruiting Cruiser visits Cottage Grove on June 8. The cruiser will be at the high school auditorium at 8:00 p. m.

W. E. Bell, Lane county navy recruiter announces that Yeoman Third Class Inez Ford of the WAVES and Ensign Frances Huxley of the SPARS will accompany the crew of recruiters from the Oregon main station at Portland on its visit to this district.

Applicants for either of the women's reserves must be between 20 and 36, with at least two years of high school, must have U. S. citizenship and have no dependents under 18 years of age. Applicants also must be in good health.

Yeoman Ford and Ensign Huxley will explain the unlimited opportunities offered by the WAVES

and SPARS. There are more than 40 jobs which tie into civilian work.

Married women are eligible, provided their husbands are not in the same service. For example, a woman married to a Navy man is eligible for the SPARS, and a woman whose husband is in the Coast Guard may join the WAVES.

The personnel from the Portland station making the cruiser tour are Chief Specialist F. T. Garesche, Specialist First Class Stanley Church and Yeoman Third Class Arthur Allen.

They will explain the Navy's new educational programs which enable volunteers to continue their education while in the service. More than 70 high school and 700 college courses are offered.

Information also will be provided on the Navy's Construction Battalion, popularly known as Seabees. This branch of the service offers many opportunities for men with experience in construction work.

Ration Calendar

GASOLINE:

"A" book coupons No. 6, good for four gallons each outside the eastern gasoline shortage area.

SUGAR:

Coupon No. 13 became valid June 1, and will be good for 5 lbs. through August 15. Coupons No. 15 and 16 are good for 5 lbs. each for home canning purposes. Housewives may apply to their local boards for additional rations if necessary.

COFFEE:

Stamp No. 24 (1 lb.) became valid May 31 and is good through June.

FUEL OIL:

Period 5 coupons valid in all zones until September 30.

SHOES:

No. 17 stamp in war ration book one good for one pair through June 15. Stamp No. 18 (1 pair) will become valid June 16.

MEATS, ETC.:

Red stamps J and K good through June 30. L becomes valid June 6.

PROCESSED FOODS:

Blue stamps G, H, J remain valid through June 7. K, L, M will continue good through July 7.

'Monkey Hairs' in Mines

In certain German lignite mines the workmen are familiar with rubber fibers called "monkey hairs," according to Dr. Fisher.
