DOING A JOB.

The average American is doing the best job he can whether it be on the firing line, at home or in some defense industry. Unless one is subject to military call he or she has the choice of staying at home or going to a defense center, depending on the type of work for which the individual is best suited and a move away from home is not always motivated by patriotism; more often it is motivated by the desire to get ahead financially or get along in the world. Some improvement has been made since the last war in the position of those called on to do military duty. The prospect usually has the opportunity to select the branch of service he likes best either before he is inducted or afterwards.

Post-war planners recognizing the need of a stabilizing influence in the community have urged that all community enterprises be left intact if possible, which will lessen the post-war program of rehabilitation. So the man at home has a job to do as well as those called away. Without knowing the full circumstances of those whom we think should be in some branch of military service, we ought to hesitate to offer any criticism of these individuals. Perhaps the public does not know it, but so far as we know, no county selective service board will permit the publication of those selected for service until each prospect has passed his medical examination. In fairness to those turned back as physically unfit, all names are withheld until the final examination is passed. This helps to prevent unjust criticism and petty remarks about those whom we think should be in the army and are not.

NEWSPAPER SITUATION

Last week we were notified by the supply house that the mills which make paper we use would not manufacture newspapers this summer. The reason was not assigned.

Fortunately we believe that we will be able to pull through without any undue hardship, but this item, which is now rationed to all larger newspapers and magazines serves to give the impression of growing scarcity of materials. It should not cause alarm to those who are willing to make the best of the situation nor cause a buying rush because some materials are not available in the usual peacetime quantity.

SAINTS

You have heard of the saints, but perhaps never heard why they were. Well, here's a motto that should help explain and incidentally much of it could be used during the present day. Where the motto came from we do not know:

"Why were the saints, saints? Because they were cheerful when it was difficult to be cheerful; patient when it was difficult to be patient, and because they pushed on when they wanted to stand still, and kept silent when they wanted to be disagreeable. That was all. It was quite simple and always will be."

SUBSIDIES

The people have found that subsidies are like taxes, once inaugurated, they are hard to stop. In 1933 the government used the subsidy method to help keep the farmer on the farm. Now in war times and high prices we are using it to try to peg inflation. And once the spiral of inflation starts, it does not make sense to most people to try and stop the spiral by rolling back prices two or three cents per pound and charging it up to the consumer in the form of taxes.

Inflation can be stopped if prices are pegged soon enough, which was not the case in the present war.
