

Need for Army Nurses Desperate

There is such a desperate need for graduate nurses in the army that Governor Earl Snell is appealing at once for commissions and urges young women who can take nurse training to make themselves available for that duty. The Governor says that as yet the nurses and the army in general apparently do not realize that the shortage of graduate nurses is critical, but as this personnel finally becomes aware of vital need of the army, he is convinced that there will be a quick response.

With American troops spreading over the globe in active service, there has never been such a demand for graduate nurses. Wounded and disabled soldiers cannot all receive the attention to alleviate their suffering because of this shortage. To attract qualified nurses, the army is offering commissions. They will be sent to scenes of action wherever there is a contingent of troops.

For replacement of the graduate nurses now with the civilian population, all young women are anxious to aid in the war effort are requested to enter student nursing to assist in relieving the situation which has developed. The army states that there is no finer training for married life than the nursing profession.

As for the army nurse, Governor Snell adds that no woman in American life is more looked up to than the army nurse. The pay is good and the standing of these women is at the very top.
