

Thirty-Four Rodent Control Men Named

Thirty-four rodent control supervisors for 1943 were appointed last week by the Lane county court on recommendation of O. S. Fletcher, county agent. These people were nominated by nine Granges and will lead voluntary ground squirrel control work in their respective communities and will also have authority to go up-

on neglected land and poison squirrels at the expense of the owner.

Gray digger ground squirrel control work is carried on in Lane County in accordance with Chapter XXVI Oregon Code 1930 and amendments thereto, and all of the county is a squirrel control district in accordance with this law. Notice to all persons owning or having dominion over land in the county to exterminate ground squirrels was given during May by the county agent, who is responsible under the law for the ground squirrel control program.

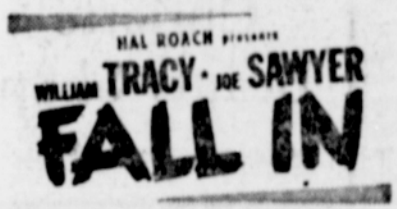

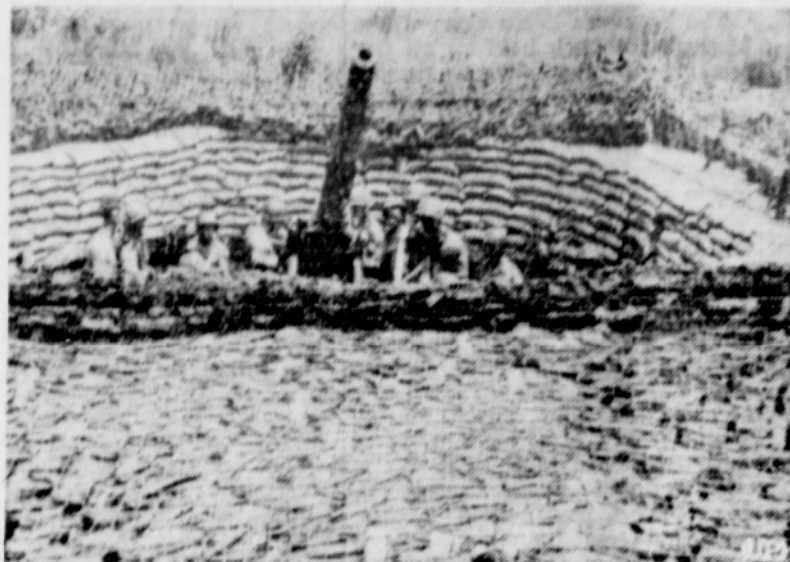

Oregon's new financial responsibility law became effective Wednesday, June 9, along with changes in four other motor vehicle laws of this state, enacted at the 1943 session of the state legislative assembly.

Laws effective after June 9:

1. The financial responsibility law which provides that persons involved in traffic accidents must be able to show proof of financial responsibility or their driver's licenses and registration plates may be revoked.

2. The repeal of the law requiring every driver to take the state driver's license examination at least once every four years. Also repealed is the law requiring persons 70 years of age or older, who hold current licenses, to take the examination for renewals.

The supreme court, by a 7 to 2 split Monday at Washington, reversed itself and upheld the right of children of Jehovah's Witnesses to refrain from saluting the American flag at public schools because the salute is contrary to their religious beliefs.

The court specifically overruled as famous Gobitis decision of three years ago, in which it held that children of members of this religious sect could be compelled to salute the flag in public school exercises on penalty of expulsion from school.

Motorists' 'A' Gasoline Coupon Book Renewal Plan Is Announced

Plans to renew motorists' "A" gasoline coupon books by mail under the streamlined renewal plan recently announced by the OPA beginning June 22 have been completed by the local War Price and Rationing Board, Mrs. L. J. McLaughlin, chairman, announced yesterday.

She coupled this announcement with a request that car owners file their applications as soon as possible so that the Board may process them and mail out all new books before the present "A" ration expires July 21.

The mail renewal plan, which also includes renewals of the basic "D" motorcycle ration, eliminates the school house registration that was necessary when basic rations were issued last autumn. To get his new "A" or "D" books a car and motorcycle owner needs take only the following simple steps:

1. Pick up an application form at any service station or following places: London, Culp Creek, Durona, Disston, Lorane. The forms will be available at these places beginning June 22.

2. Fill out the form and mail it to the War Price and Rationing Board together with (a) the back cover of the present "A" or "D" book (properly filled out), and (b) the current tire inspection record showing that proper inspections have been made.

"With volunteer help now being enlisted the Board will begin processing the applications as soon as they start coming in," Mrs. McLaughlin said. "New ration books will be mailed back as soon as they are ready. Every effort will be made to have new books in the hands of all car and motorcycle owners by July 21, when their present books expire."

The new application forms, like those used last year, will have a tire inspection record attached. Mrs. McLaughlin pointed out. In filling out the form, applicants should make sure that their serial numbers are accurately written in. These numbers may be copied from the old tire record, as corrected at time of last inspection, unless the applicant has acquired a new tire since then. In this case, he should write in the new tire number and attach a note explaining this to the Board.

The back cover of the present ration book is required as part of the application because it is evidence that the owner held "properly issued ration and is entitled to a renewal," the chairman explained.

Any motorists who have not had at least one tire inspection by a qualified inspector will be denied a renewal.

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Drafting Fathers Expected in Aug

WASHINGTON — Testimony made public Monday in connection with the manpower commission program gave scant comfort to draft-age fathers, indicating that a majority of the physically fit will be in service by the end of this year. Inductions from that class are expected to start in August and run through the end of 1943. At the end of the year inductions, now running about 300,000 per month, will be cut about 60 per cent, under plans revealed in the testimony, and be limited largely to youths newly reaching draft age. Fathers not in uniform by then, it was indicated, stand an excellent chance of never going to war.

Administrator McNutt estimated that a net increase of 1,200,000 must be made by July 1, 1944, in the labor force and armed manpower of the nation. He arrived at the figure by adding 1,300,000 needed by war industries to 2,400,000 to be inducted, and subtracting 2,500,000 to be released from civilian industries.

He said "a large share of the new workers will be 'home' makers, without young children, who live in war production centers."

ADMIRAL WARNS OF NEED FOR FUEL OIL RATIONING

Vice Admiral Frank Jack Fletcher, Commandant of the Thirteenth Naval District and Commander of the Northwest Sea Frontier, issued the following statement from his headquarters this week:

"The Commandant has received a communication from the Navy Department concerning the need for rationing of fuel oil in this area. The following points were brought out:

(1) The supply of crude oil, particularly from sources on the West Coast of the United States, is such that conservation is essential;

(2) Although nothing will be done by the Navy Department which is not considered absolutely necessary as a war measure, the indications are that tanker facilities to serve the Pacific Northwest will be somewhat less than those enjoyed up to this time.

(3) It appears that rail transportation will not be available to supply the fuel oil in lieu of tankers and consequently effective rationing becomes ever more essential."
