Ration Calendar

GASOLINE:
"A" book coupons No. 6, good for four gallons each, outside the eastern gasoline shortage area. Within the east coast shortage "A" book coupons No. 5 good for three gallons each, must last through July 21. "B" and "C" coupons cut to 2½ gallons in shortage area.

SUGAR:
Coupon No. 13 good for 5 lbs. through August 15, coupons No. 15 and 16 are good through October 31 for 5 lbs. each for home canning purposes. Housewives may apply to their local ration boards if necessary.

COFFEE:
Stamp No. 24 (1 lb.) is good through June 30.

FUEL OIL:
Period 5 coupons valid in all zones until September 30.

SHOES:
Stamp No. 18 (1 pair) became valid June 16.

MEATS, ETC.:
Red stamps J, K, L, M, good through June 30, becomes valid June 20.

PROCESSED FOODS:
Blue stamps K, L, M, continue good through July 7.
