LATEST GUIDE FOR USING OIL SPRAYS JUST ISSUED

Latest information on the most effective use of petroleum oil sprays in controlling fruit insects is contained in a new O.S.C. station circular, No. 151, written by Leroy Childs, superintendent of the Hood River branch station, and R. H. Robinson, agricultural chemist, Corvallis.

Combined field and laboratory studies in the past 10 years have shown the importance of selecting the proper oil spray for each job, and precautions necessary in mixing the oil in the spray tank, especially when used in combination with other spray materials.

The investigator found that general recommendations need to be modified for different localities, hence it is well to consult local authorities before undertaking any comprehensive spraying job where oil is to be used.
