Local Traffic Data To Be Available Here

Chief of Police M. A. Perry today announced he had completed arrangements whereby traffic accident statistics and other information relative to this city would be made available in a monthly service from the traffic safety division of the office of Secretary of State Bob Farrell.

The information thus obtained will aid the police department and other interested agencies in conducting accident prevention programs in this city, Chief Perry declared.

The monthly safety service from the state traffic safety division will include posters, statistical analysis of local accident experience, and maps of this city showing the location of accidents and their types, general information on the accident situation in the state as a whole and in other cities of this population classification and safety material prepared by national safety organizations.

Chief Perry urged whole-hearted observance of traffic regulations and care and caution in driving and walking as a means of holding down local accidents. Placing special emphasis upon pedestrian safety, he suggested these rules for those who walk: never jaywalk, cross only at intersections or designated crosswalks; obey traffic signals where they are in operation; look to the left, then to the right before stepping off the curb; never step into the street from between parked cars; when walking on rural highways, always walk on the left, facing approaching traffic; and at night, wear a white or display a lighted flashlight.
