Slaughterers Must Submit Evidence By First of July

Every local slaughterer and butcher who holds a permit to slaughter livestock for the sale of meat will be required to submit evidence by July 15, to substantiate the amount of livestock slaughtered during the period—in 1941 or 1942—upon which his current quota is based, the War Food Administration said today.

Purpose of the ruling is to establish a more uniform system of permits and quotas and also to adjust those quotas already issued, so that they will represent the normal share of total slaughter for each section of the country. Because of the rapidity with which the permits originally were issued, the policy in granting the quotas varied somewhat from section to section.

Ration Calendar

GASOLINE:

"A" book coupons No. 6, good for four gallons each, through July 21. "B" and "C" coupons cut to 2½ gallons in shortage area.

SUGAR:

Coupon No. 13 good for 5 lbs. through August 15. Coupons No. 15 and 16 are good through October 31 for 5 lbs. each for home canning purposes. Housewives may apply to their local ration boards for more if necessary.

COFFEE:

Stamp No. 24 (1 lb.) is good through June 30. Stamp 21 becomes valid for one pound July 1 and expires July 21. Stamp 22 valid for one pound July 22 to August 11.

FUEL OIL:

Period 5 coupons valid in all zones until September 30.

SHOES:

Stamp No. 18 (1 pair) is valid through October 31.

MEATS, ETC.:

Red Stamps J, K, L, M, N, expire June 30. Red stamp P became valid June 27. Q becomes valid July 4. R on July 11; S on July 18. All expire July 31.

PROCESSED FOODS:

Blue stamps K, L, M, continue good through July 7. Blue stamps N, P, and Q will be valid from July 1 through August 7.
