Timely Recipes

Strawberry Sherbet

¾ cup crushed strawberries
6 tbsps sugar
1 tsp orange juice
1 tsp lemon juice
1 tsp unflavored gelatin
2 cups milk
Few grains salt
1 egg white
Combine ¾ cup crushed strawberries with sugar, orange juice and lemon juice; let stand 30 minutes. Press through sieve. Sprinkle gelatin over 1 cup milk; heat until gelatin is dissolved; combine with remaining milk and salt. Pour into freezing tray and chill. Beat egg white stiff, fold into strawberry mixture. Combine chilled milk mixture with strawberry mixture. Pour into freezing tray and freeze, stirring several times during freezing. Serves 4.
