Money for these bombs was contributed by 350 members of Burlington, Iowa, American Legion Post No. 52. When they reached North Africa, First Lieutenant William A. Whitmore, commanding officer of an Army Air Force ordnance company, and a resident of Burlington, took a personal interest in the contribution from his home town. WAR BOND QUIZ

Q. May I sell a Bond or give it away?
A. No. War Savings Bonds are not transferable.

Q. May a beneficiary redeem a Bond during the lifetime of the registered owner?
A. No. The Bond will be paid to the beneficiary by the Treasury only when the beneficiary has furnished the Treasury with proof of the owner's death.

Q. How much does a War Bond cost?

A. The price of War Bonds is 75 percent of their maturity value. For a \$25 denomination Bond, for example, you pay \$18.75 and at maturity in 10 years you receive \$25. This is the smallest Bond you can buy.

Q. How do I receive my Bond?
A. If you buy over the counter for cash, it will be delivered at that time. If ordered by mail, it will be mailed to your address or to anyone whom you designate.

Remember—the longer you keep War Bonds, up to 10 years, the more valuable they become.

Good news for the coffee drinkers in Mrs. America's family. In view of the present favorable supply situation, the Office of Price Administration has increased the coffee ration to one pound every three weeks. Stamp 21 in war ration book one becomes valid for one pound of coffee on July 1 and will expire on July 21. Stamp 22 will be valid from July 22 to August 11. It is the first time since coffee rationing began, that supplies have reached a normal level and that imports to sustain that volume can be anticipated.
