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Timely Recipes

Applesauce Salad

1 cup boiling water
1 1/2 cups thick applesauce
1 pkg lime-flavored gelatin
Salad greens
2 cups cottage cheese
1/2 cup diced celery
1/4 cup mayonnaise
Seasonings

Combine water and applesauce, and bring to boil, while stirring. Pour over gelatin; stir until gelatin is dissolved. Pour into 6 individual ring molds, which have been rinsed in cold water. Chill until set. Unmold on bed of salad greens. Combine cottage cheese, celery, mayonnaise, and salt and pepper to taste. Pile in center of molds. Top with dash of paprika. Serves 6.

Cottage Cheese Salad Dressing

1/2 cup cottage cheese
1 tsp vinegar
1/2 cup salad oil
1/2 tsp salt
1/4 tsp sugar
Onion juice

Press cottage cheese through sieve, add vinegar, salad oil, salt and sugar. Scrape cut surface of onion with fork and whip cottage cheese mixture with same fork. If you prefer, put all ingredients into bowl and beat with rotary egg beater. Makes two-thirds cup.
