



AIR FIGHTERS BIVOAC IN GREENLAND—The rigors and hazards of air patrol along the bleak Greenland coast are demonstrated in this picture of a U. S. Army Air Forces Mission patrol mission forced down on the inhospitable Arctic fjord by bad weather and zero-zero visibility.

Unhurt, except for bruises and scratches, members of the crew cut their way out of the plane and improvised a snow shelter, using one wing as a roof. Then they rationed their emergency food supply, melted snow for water, and kept sending out weak radio signals in hope of directing rescue. On the fourth day they were sighted and photographed from the air, and rescued by a Coast Guard vessel immediately dispatched to the scene.

FEEDING MINERALS BY "SHOTGUN PRESCRIPTIONS" OF MINERAL FEEDS VETED

"Shot-gun prescriptions" of high-sounding lists of minerals are no more needed by livestock, as a rule, than humans need to take a lot of food pills in addition to a well-balanced diet, points out Dr. J. R. Haag, animal nutrition chemist at Oregon State college in a recent station circular 153, "Minerals for Farm Animals."

He states the matter a bit more scholarly than that, saying "Good nutrition and the economical production of livestock call for the use of only those mineral supplements for which there appears to be a reasonably indicated need."

Bone meal, used extensively as a mineral supplement for poultry and other types of livestock is so scarce now that Dr. Haag cautions against using grades unfit for animal feeding. Raw rock phosphate is also hazardous as it contains highly toxic fluorine.

The experiment station will make suggestions, concerning probable need of mineral supplements if an accurate description of the kind and amount of feed-stuffs used is sent in.

SAVERS OF GARDEN SEED CAUTIONED ABOUT MIXUPS

Many victory gardeners who plan to save their own seed for next year will need to find out which are safe to save and which will be likely to be damaged by cross pollination, says O. T. McWhorter, extension horticulturist. In general, beans, peas, lettuce and tomato seed can be saved with no advance precautions. Sweet corn may be contaminated

if grown within 250 yards of other corn. Varieties of cucumbers, muskmelons and watermelons will each cross with other varieties, but the three do not intercross. Summer squash varieties cross with each other and with Connetquot field pumpkin, but not with the Hubbard group.

Many types of garden vegetables such as kale, cabbage, beets, carrots and parsnips are biennials and produce seed the second year. When these are in bloom in their second season most of them cross freely, among varieties and sometimes with related or wild plants. County agents can give more detailed information on this subject.

Most types of left-over seed can safely be saved and used next year. Types good only for one to three years include beans, corn, onions, parsley, parsnip, peas and salsify. Most others are good from four to 10 years.

SOLDIERS' LIFE INSURANCE

Soldiers—at home or abroad—are reminded that less than three weeks remain in which they can get National Service Life Insurance without a physical examination. Until August 10, 1943, every application will be accepted regardless of the individual's medical condition. After August 10 a rigid physical examination will be required.

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'Hitler's Children' Now Showing at Arcade Theater

What happens when two courageous youngsters set themselves against the irresistible Nazi machine and its inhuman teachings, is developed in RKO Radio's unusual romantic drama, "Hitler's Children."

Warner as a heroic churchman who defies the Hitler system. Also featured are Lloyd Corrigan and Erford Gage. "Hitler's Children" opened at the Arcade Theater yesterday for a four-day run.

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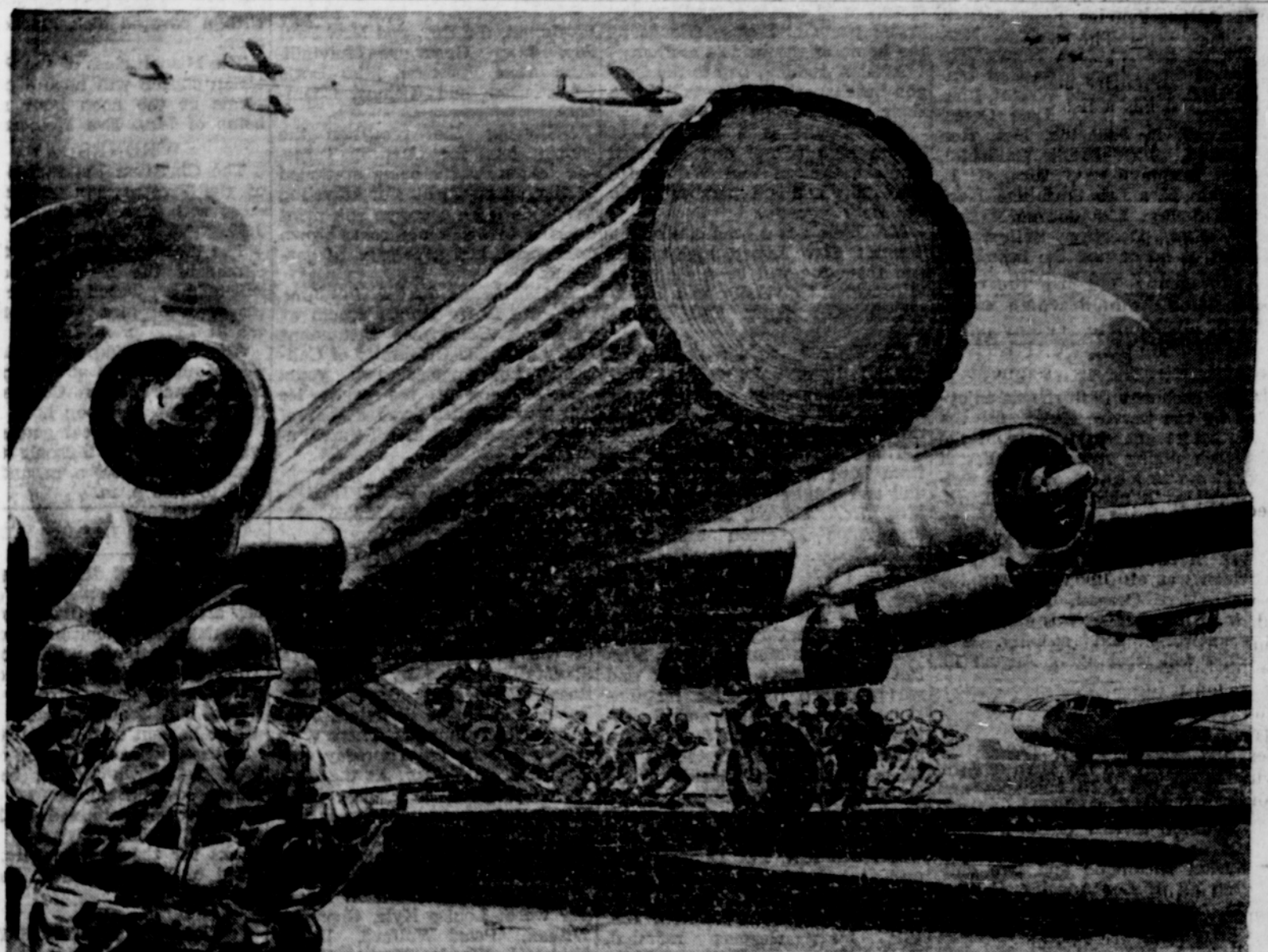
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
