Ration Calendar

RATION BOOK NO. 2

July 31—Expiration date for red stamps P, Q, R and S (meats-fats). Red stamp U becomes valid August 1; V on August 8, and W on August 15—all, including T, expire August 31. Each weekly series good for 16 points.

August 7—Expiration date for blue stamps N, P and Q (processed foods). Blue stamps R, S and T valid from August 1 through September 7.

RATION BOOK NO. 1

Sugar: August 15—Sugar stamp No. 13, good for 5 pounds expires. Sugar stamp No. 14 for 5 pounds, valid August 16, good through October 31. Canning sugar stamps No. 15 and 16, each good for 5 pounds, expire October 31.

(Maximum 25-pound allowance of sugar for canning includes 5 pounds each from stamps 15 and 16, five pounds may be used for jams, jellies, and preserves).

Coffee: August 11—Stamp No. 22, good for one pound, expires.

Shoes: October 31—Stamp No. 18, good for one pair of shoes, expires.

Fuel Oil: September 30—Period 5 coupons valid March 26 through September 30. Heating coupons—one unit, value ten gallons; ten units, 100 gallons.

Gasoline: September 21—No. 7 stamps in A book, each good for 4 gallons, valid through this date.

Tires: Cars with C ration books must have tires inspected every three months; B books every four months; A books every 6 months. September 30 next inspection deadline for A book holders.

Chickens Like Green Food

Green food is of utmost importance for growing chicken stock, and a good stand of alfalfa, clover or bluegrass will aid materially in reducing feed costs. A clover range is probably best, but bluegrass or alfalfa followed by a succession of young oats or wheat will produce excellent results.

"Soilless Gardening" by Gerick explains about growing vegetables by water and chemicals. By the way, the men on Wake Island had some very successful gardens of this kind before the Japs spoiled everything.

"The Gardener's Travel Book" by Farrington tells of parks and beauty spots all over the United States arranged conveniently by states.

Priscilla Hovey Wright shows the funny side of gardening in "Weeds Are More Fun." Anne Cleveland's pictures add greatly to the fun.

There are books on roses, lilies, dahlias, lawns, rock gardens, insects, hedges and many more special subjects.

If you have no gardening problem to bring to the Garden Center, come anyway and look at the books. They are illustrated, many in color.
