half hour on the subway. You can imagine how quickly you have to get on and off. It's really quite an experience to go tearing along so rapidly underground, water, etc., for only the price of five cents.

We visited the Miltmore hotel where a USO is maintained for service women. You have probably seen pictures of the beautiful powder room where Elizabeth Arden products are distributed free for use at all times. We could also eat candy of a good quality if we wished.

The famous Reid Mansion that has been turned over to the service women is well-known, too. This is the first mansion I have ever seen. It is immense. Its beauty is beyond written description. In that mansion famous personages have been entertained and one could just imagine what a big ball would be like. Music comes from the walls. There are numerous rare paintings and tapestries hanging. You can eat, sleep, shower, read, entertain guests, or do most anything you wish. On our ferry trip to Staten Island—free for service women—we had a close view of the Statue of Liberty. One has no idea how immense it is. Much to my surprise, it was green in color—no doubt camouflage. We passed Governor's Island which has been taken over by the Army. Saw a convoy entering the harbor, various transport ships, the Normandie on its side, the Queen Mary ready to go out, the Queen Elizabeth, the Atiquinnia, dry docks, etc. The ocean going vessels were certainly huge. On this harbor trip we also saw the half-sunk munitions ship that New York was so worried about when it caught on fire.

On a tour through lower Manhattan, I enjoyed going through Trinity Church, the church having the most wealthy congregation and the first church of New York. It is beautiful inside but very, very ancient—built in the early 16th century. Around the exterior is an old graveyard with worn monuments of such personages as Alexander Hamilton, Robert, Fulton, etc.

On this same tour we saw Morgan House, Wall Street (and that's just what it is for you can't glimpse the sky, the Stock Exchange, Washington's Statue. Where this statue is located was the place George Washington became the first president. The mayor of New York also receives guests here. We saw The Bowery (slum section), China Town (very junky looking), the Chrysler Building (one of the many skyscrapers—86 floors).

It's really a thrill to go atop the Empire State building—102 floors or decks as I should say in Navy language. You can see for miles around. A speedy elevator takes you up 62 floors in three seconds. You change twice to slower elevators before reaching the very top. We also took in a guided tour of Rockefeller Center. It, too, has wonders galore. The buildings range in height so people can look down on various levels to see roof gardens. They are so spaced to receive the maximum of sunshine. The tallest building of this group had 81 floors.

Saw Times Square which is a triangle, the famous Central Park, the Times Building where news is continually flashing across one side for passers-by to read. Window shopped at Sak's (the exclusive New York store where wash cloths are from \$4.50 and up per cloth), shopped on Broadway,

42nd street, etc. We ate twice in an Automat. Here you put nickles in boxes to get anything you desire. The food is super. These are some of the things we saw on Saturday.

Sunday we went to church at St. Patrick's cathedral—mostly to see the beautiful architecture. It is breath-taking. We really had intended to go to St. John's Episcopal which is so widely publicized but the subway we were on was crowded and we couldn't get off on the right street in time. The President of Ecuador was attending services while we were at church.

We had Sunday dinner at the Waldorf Astoria—mostly to see what it was like for we had heard so much about it on the West coast. All of the people were in formal attire. It certainly is a ritzy place.

In the afternoon we attended Radio City Music Hall. Saw an excellent movie and wonderful hour and a half stage presentation of ballet, light opera, dancing, magicians, etc. The lighting effects and costumes were gorgeous. The theatre seats 9,000 people. The stage is a block in size. New York movies are not conserved like those shown in Oregon.

I was fortunate to be able to attend a NBC broadcast by Toscanini in the evening. It was very good. I believe I enjoyed his presentation of the Surprise Symphony most of all.

These are some of the highlights of my weekend in New York. This city has so much to offer; it is very difficult to decide what to see in such a short time. During my last week at Hunter College, I saw Helen Jacobs playing in a tennis match for leisure recreation. She is an ensign at Hunter.

I am very much impressed with Iowa. The rich black soil and the countless rows of corn stretching out to the horizon are very picturesque. Since the country is quite flat, it seems you can see so much sky without much exertion of the head. The College is on the outskirts of town—right next door to the farming area. As I said before, the campus is very beautiful. There is a big tower in the center containing a huge clock which constantly reminds me of Big Ben. It plays hymns and folk songs three times a day as well as chimes the quarter hour. Right now it is playing The Bells of St. Mary's.

I might mention that the day before we left for Iowa, the Company, 250 members, which I was invited to attend a base-

ball game in Brooklyn between the Brooklyn Dodgers and the New York Giants. We paraded through the streets of Brooklyn to hand music with crowds of people cheering us on the sidewalks. It was very impressive and thrilling.

Think I had better close for this time for I'll be anxious to receive some good lengthy letters, too. Hope you enjoy reading this as much as I have enjoyed writing to you.

GOOSEBERRY, CURRANT GUIDES OUT

Production of best quality currants and gooseberries in Oregon or elsewhere requires that some attention be given the bushes throughout the year and not only just before they fruit, when sprays are applied for the currant and gooseberry maggot. This fact is brought out in a new bulletin, "Insect Pests and Diseases of Currants and Gooseberries," by Don C. Mote, entomologist of the OSC experiment station. In addition to full description of such troubles, the bulletin also contains a complete spray program for these fruits.

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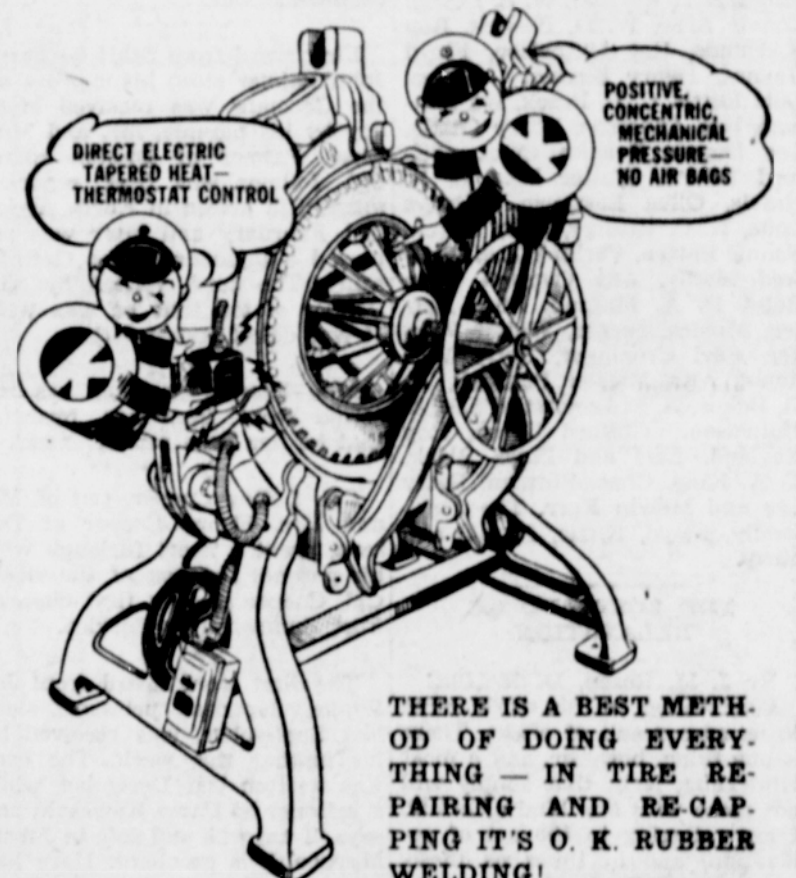
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
