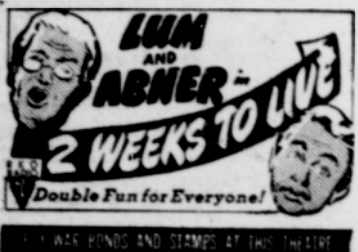
Japs Fooled

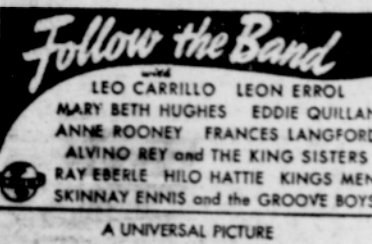

Death in Paper

Of all the shells that raked Sicily last week from American ships, very few were duds. Among the reasons for the high percentage of effectiveness was that through all the hard knocks of wartime transport, these death-dealing shells were protected from damage and from the corrosive influences of salt water. For they rode in powerful "suits of armor"—made of paper. But this is no ordinary paper. These paper containers are so sturdy that in tests a 30-pound shell is inserted and the container is hurled ten feet to a concrete floor, then submerged in water for 48 hours without harm to the projectile. Behind this success story of wartime accomplishment is another example of magic industrial conversion.
