Old School Mates Picnic Is Held at City Park Saturday

From August, 1936 when the old school mates met at the home of Mrs. Anna Petrie, 212 Columbia Court, city, to organize the old school mates picnic to July 31, 1943 is a space of 7 years during which time they have met and renewed old acquaintances, each year. Last year Emma Branstetter came from Los Angeles, but this year Mrs. Bessie Griffin Smith of Harris, Minnesota, came even farther.

About 1 p. m. a bountiful potluck dinner was enjoyed by the 89 present. After dinner a business meeting was held and the following officers elected: Mrs. Walter Baker, president; Fay McLaughlin, vice president; Walter Baker, secretary-treasurer; Miss Belle Burkholder, publicity.

Mrs. Hattie Best of Portland spoke of the first time the school mates met stating it was all girls then, but later they decided the boys had gone to school too, so decided to enlarge the membership to include the male sex also.

Fannie Goude told of her early school days. Group singing was indulged in, and a group picture of the entire company assembled by the tennis court was taken by Mrs. Benetta Teeters Combs of Springfield.

It was near the birthdays of both S. C. (Curtis) Veatch and I. H. (Hamilton) Veatch, brothers, and their sister had baked a birthday cake adorned with candles to celebrate the occasion. I. H. Veatch who was one of the oldest members present told of the first school house in Latham which was built near the present railroad bridge and had small panes of window glass, which is again in vogue. The school district then embraced as far south as Divide, taking in part of Coast Fork up to as far as the old Rousey sawmill, and to the north as far as the H. C. (Uncle Burn) Veatch homestead. Uncle Burn was the father of O. O. Veatch, and Mrs. Eva Holderman.

It was decided to extend the time of those eligible to attend from the early days of 1880 to 1900. This includes all those who attended school either in Latham where the first school was built before Cottage Grove had a school house, or in Cottage Grove, where the first school house was located on ground now occupied by the A. W. Helliwell residence. All those attending school prior to 1900 instead of 1895 are now eligible to attend the meetings.

Mrs. W. F. (May) Hart invited all those present to attend her next wedding anniversary, the 50th, at the Portland home of the Harts on June 27, 1944.

Ration Calendar

RATION BOOK NO. 2.

August 31—Expiration date of red stamps T, U, V and W (meats and fats). T series became valid July 25; U valid August 1; V on August 8, and W on August 15. Each weekly series good for 16 points.

August 7—Expiration date of blue stamps N, P and Q (processed foods). Blue stamps R, S and T valid from August 1 to September 20.

RATION BOOK NO. 1.

Sugar: August 15—Expiration date of stamp No. 13, 5 pounds. Stamp No. 14 valid August 16, through October 31. Canning sugar stamps No. 15 and 16, each good for 5 pounds, expire October 31. (Maximum 25-pound allowance of sugar for canning includes 5 pounds each from stamps 15 and 16, five pounds may be used for jams, jellies and preserves).

Shoes: October 31—Expiration date of stamp No. 18 for one pair of shoes.

Fuel Oil: September 30—Period 5 coupons valid March 26 through September 30. Heating coupons—one unit, value ten gallons; ten units, 100 gallons.

Gasoline: September 21—Expiration date of No. 7 stamps in A book, each good for 4 gallons.

Tires: Cars with C ration books must have tires inspected every 3 months; B books every 4 months; A books every 6 months. September 30 next inspection deadline for A book holders. Commercial motor vehicles—tire inspections every 6 months or every 5,000 miles, whichever occurs first.

Civilians who have not yet received War Ration Three through the mail should apply in person to their local War Price and Rationing Boards on or before August 10, the district OPA announced today. Those who mailed the application in June, should present the identification stub which was detached from the application blank.

Tuesday PM's—August 3. Brewers of beer and ale who bring new brands onto the market must now establish maximum prices for them in line with their own most

similar product, the OPA announced today. Previously, new products were priced in line with the most similar product of competitors. Now, this will be used only where there is no similar product of the same brewer.

Today's action was taken through Amendment No. 2 to Maximum Price Regulation No. 259 (Domestic Malt Beverages), effective August 9.
