A A A Seed Purchase Plan In Effect for Fourth Year

Purchase of winter legume and annual ryegrass seed from Oregon growers will again be a part of the government's program to promote fullest use of winter cover crops to increase food and fiber production in southern and east central states, the state AAA office announced this week.

For the fourth consecutive year, Oregon growers may sell their seed crops to Commodity Credit corporation through county AAA committees for shipment to the southland, where it is furnished through dealers to farmers who are cooperating in the soil conservation program.

Prices paid to growers, grade requirements and method of purchase are practically unchanged from last year's program, through which nearly 100 million pounds of Oregon seed was handled. Hungarian vetch, which was purchased last year, is not included on the schedule released to county AAA offices this week and will not be eligible under the 1943 program.

Basic prices to growers for top grades of seed have been announced as follows: Austrian Winter peas, 5 cents a pound; hairy vetch, 10 cents; common vetch, 5 cents; crimson clover, 10 cents; common ryegrass, 5 cents; Monantha vetch, 6 1/2 cents; rough and perennial peavine, 10 cents; and Willamette vetch, ranging from 6 1/2 cents for blue tag to 5 1/2 cents for white tag. Appropriate differentials apply to seed of less than the basic germination and purity requirements.

RECENT WAR BOOKS AT LIBRARY

Some of the latest and most authentic and thrilling books written since the beginning of World War No. 2 are now available at the public city library. Among these is the book "Seven Came Through" by Captain Edward V. Rickenbacker. No more gallant saga of the sea, no more thrilling record of achievement in the air has ever been presented to the American public than Captain Rickenbacker's own story of the 21 harrowing days which he and his companions spent adrift on the Pacific.

On the rental shelf you will find two very interesting books on the war entitled "I Flew for China" and "Behind the Face of Japan." "I Flew for China" was written by Captain Royal Leonard who was personal private pilot to Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek. No one can tell the complete story of China's fight for freedom and all her long and aggressive resistance against a brutal and aggressive invader, but Captain Leonard's story is replete with all the candid details possible only to a man who was the only white man to know the location of every landing field public, private, and military, in the Republic of China.

"Behind the Face of Japan" by Upton Close is the book that has been eagerly awaited and is another war book found on the rental shelf. Mr. Close gives a full-length portrait of what lies behind the celebrated "face," the "so-sorry" attitude of Japan. He reveals the Japanese philosophy, gives thumb-nail portraits of important personalities and without a doubt supplies the Western World with one of the best "background" books on the war in the Pacific now available.

Five small fruit varieties which have been named and introduced

for general use from the cooperative small fruit breeding project at the Oregon State college experiment station are described in a new station bulletin No. 416 "New Berries from Oregon's Plant Breeding Research."

The five berries that have been selected from more than 150,000 individual crosses are the Corvallis and Brightmore strawberries, Pacific and Cascade blackberries and Willamette red raspberry.

The Cascade and Pacific blackberries are both hybrids resulting from crossing one of the trailing wild blackberries with the Logan berry. In size they approximate the Logan and have the characteristic flavor of the wild trailing blackberry.

The new Willamette red raspberry produces big yields of large berries excellent alike for canning, freezing or the fresh fruit market. The flavor while good is not as intense as that of the Cuthbert.

Authors of the bulletin are George F. Waldo, federal horti-

culturalist in charge of the cooperative project; E. H. Wiegand, head of the food industries department; and Henry Hartman, head of the horticultural department.
