Browned Beef with Creamed Gravy

1 tbsp butter
1 lb. ground beef
1 diced onion
4 tbsp flour
1/2 tsp powdered mustard
1 tsp salt
1/4 tsp pepper
2 1/2 cups milk

Melt butter in skillet; add ground beef and onion and brown. Sprinkle flour over mixture; 1/4 seasonings; cook until blended and flour is browned. Add milk slowly, stirring constantly, and cook until the gravy is thickened. Serve hot with baked potatoes. Serves 6.
