Rationing Office Needs Volunteers

Volunteers are needed at the local rationing office to aid in filing applications. Mrs. L. J. McLaughlin, chairman, said yesterday. The need for help at this office continues. In the past the services of volunteers have been of material assistance in keeping the board functioning properly and the need has not lessened.

Funds for the operation of this office are limited and only three paid employees are maintained. Some have the impression that their services should be paid for in whatever effort they make in connection with the rationing board, but are willing to donate their time in the furtherance of other war work. Mrs. McLaughlin said. Functioning of the ration setup is just as important to the general welfare of the public as any other war effort at the present time and regardless of whether we agree with the present policies of the OPA, we all agree that to cease the ration effort at the present time would result in much confusion and ultimate chaos so far as civilian economy is concerned. So your help, even part of one day each week, is needed just as badly now as any time in the past.

Mrs. McLaughlin, who has devoted much time gratis to the organizational effort of the ration board said plans are underway to organize a price panel. The price panel is being setup in every community to aid both the merchants and the consumers.

RED CROSS CLASS NEEDS HELP

A call has come for more workers at the Red Cross surgical gauze class which is held each Wednesday afternoon from 1:00 to 4:30 p. m. at the Walker school house. Ration Calendar

Gasoline

In 17 states of eastern shortage area A-6 coupons are valid until November 21. In states outside the eastern shortage area A-7 coupons are valid through September 21. All gasoline coupons in the possession of car owners must be endorsed with the owner's license number and state of registration.

Fuel Oil

Period 5 coupons in old rations remain valid through September 30. Period 1 coupons in new rations are valid now. Occupants of oil heated homes are urged to return their applications for next year's fuel oil to their ration boards promptly and when issued new rations to place orders with their dealers for summer fill-ups.

Sugar

Stamp No. 14, good for 5 lbs., is valid through October. Stamps Nos. 15 and 16 are good through October 31 for 5 lbs. Each for home canning purposes. Housewives may apply to their local ration boards for more if necessary.

Shoes

Stamp No. 18, 1 pair, is valid through October 31.

Stoves

Purchase certificates now issued and normally valid for thirty days from date of issuance, will be invalid after August 23, by which time it is expected the new nationwide stove rationing plan will be in effect.

Meat, Etc.

Red stamps T, U, V, and W, now valid, expire August 31.

Processed Foods

Blue stamps R, S, and T, remain valid through September 20.

NEW NICKEL TO BE MINTED

The Denver mint will begin coining nickel-less nickels, wartime 5-cent pieces designed to save strategic minerals, about September 1, Mint Superintendent Moses F. Smith said Saturday at Denver.

The new coins will be stamped with the regular Jefferson nickel dies and will consist of approximately 56 per cent silver, nine per cent manganese and 35 per cent copper.

Lead Line of Ship
