Uniform Grade and Scale of Logs Is Established by OPA

Uniform grading and scaling rules for logs produced in Oregon and Washington west of the crest of the Cascade mountains were announced yesterday by the OPA.

The new rules—to be used by all grading and scaling bureaus and independent graders and scalars—were drawn after extensive consultation between scaling and grading bureaus, independent scalars, the lumber and logging industry and OPA representatives.

They are incorporated into revised maximum price regulation No. 161 (West Coast Logs) in Amendment No. 7 to that regulation, and become effective August 24, 1943.

Published grading and scaling rules have been in effect in the West Coast area for many years, but differed slightly in various logging regions. The new uniform rules resolve the differences, assist in the effective operation of price control for logs, and provide the log buyer with assurance that a log of a certain grade is of the same quality and scale, no matter from what part of the territory it was produced, graded and scaled.

In the West Coast logging area, published grading and scaling rules have been in effect many years, OPA said. These rules represented a codification of previously existing rules for judging the quality and lumber content of a log in establishing its value.

The principal rules in use in the Oregon-Washington area west of the Cascades prior to unification under the present amendment were those of the Columbia River and Puget Sound grading and scaling bureaus, two of four major agencies organized to perform grading and scaling services.

The new uniform rules will provide uniform grading quality and scaling quantity for all logs graded and scaled in the territory.

AUGUST CROP REPORT

The following comment on the August crop report was made recently by Marvin Jones, War Food Administrator. "The July crop report made it clear that farmers in the face of many difficulties had substantially met, and in some cases exceeded, the crop acreage goals. During July, growing conditions were favorable and current indications are that yields per acre in 1943 will be the second largest on record. The progress of the year's production so far is gratifying. The hard work and the determination of farmers have placed us in a position to meet essential food needs, given average weather from now on."

"However, the crops are still to be harvested, marketed, and processed, and in the case of the feed crops, fed to livestock. Farmers will need additional workers for harvest, and food processing industries are short handed. The wartime food problem is not solved, though present production prospects are encouraging."

YOUNG CADET DIES FOLLOWING ACCIDENT

Word has been received here of the accidental death of Jack L. Hopper, 20-year-old aviation cadet, U.S.N.R., which occurred July 25, at the Foster Field army hospital, 27 miles north of Austin, Texas. He was on a routine instrument training flight when the plane crashed about 45 miles northeast of Corpus Christi, Texas. The pilot, Lt. (jg) George Dykstra, was killed instantly, when the wing of the plane struck a tree in what was believed to be a forced landing.

"Jack established an excellent reputation among his classmates for his outstanding traits of character and leadership, that he showed great promise as a future naval officer and aviator. The navy can ill afford to lose a man of his high caliber," was the tribute of Rear Admiral U. S. N. Commandant C. P. Mason.

Funeral services were held recently at a Forest Grove Funeral chapel, the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Harold J. Hopper and sisters, Maxine and Phyllis Hopper. He is also survived by two other brothers and sisters. Interment in the Forest Grove cemetery. Cadet Hopper was a member of the Forest Grove Christian church and a graduate of the Forest Grove high school.

Mrs. Hopper, who was Miss Annie Queen before her marriage, grew up here and the family has many relatives and friends in this section. The family spent two years at Creswell, leaving there in December, 1936, for Forest Grove, where they have resided since.

Timely Recipes

Baked Macaroni and Tomatoes

½ 8-oz. pkg macaroni
½ qts boiling water
2¼ tsp salt
¼ cup butter
¼ cup flour
¼ tsp powdered mustard
¼ tsp pepper
½ tsp condiment sauce
2 cups milk
1 tsp minced onion
½ lb. grated cheese (1 cup)
3 thinly sliced, skinned tomatoes

Cook macaroni, uncovered, in boiling water with 1½ tsp of the salt, until tender. Drain. Meanwhile, make sauce as follows: melt butter in double boiler; then stir in flour, mustard, remaining ¼ tsp salt and pepper. Add condiment sauce, milk and onion, and cook, stirring constantly until thickened. Add cheese and stir. Combine sauce and macaroni and arrange in layers with tomatoes. Bake in 400 degree oven for 20 minutes. Serves 4.
