

Many New Courses In Correspondence Offered at U. of O.

EUGENE, OREGON—Many new courses for both college and high school requirements are offered by the 1943-44 catalogue of "Correspondence Study," just released by the general extension division of the state system of higher education, reports Miss Mozelle Hair, head of correspondence study.

Timely for the college student interested in aviation are courses in elementary civilian pilot training—air navigation; elementary civilian pilot training—meteorology; secondary civilian pilot training—arodynamics; secondary civilian pilot training—aircraft powerplants; and elements of navigation. A course in the fundamentals of radio is offered for the first time as are two courses in engineering—mechanics (statics) and mechanics (dynamics).

Other additions to this year's catalogue are principles of cost accounting, advanced cost accounting, history of Hispanic America (three terms), abnormal and borderline psychology, general sociology (two terms), and modern social problems. In the high school field the following are new: pre-flight aeronautics, mechanical drawing, and five courses in biology and physics.

Under a new plan worked out with the state superintendent of public instruction, correspondence subjects have been approved for acceptance by the principal of any high school in Oregon for graduation credit. It is anticipated that many schools will take advantage of the program because of shortage of teachers.

The Bombardier Isn't a Beetle But Can Drop Eggs on Japan

Before Pearl Harbor the majority of people had never heard of a Bombardier. If they went to Webster's Unabridged they learned that he's one of several varieties of beetles.

Yet, Col. John "Paddy" Ryan, the first Bombardier, and a little group of disciples, were dropping big bombs on barrel heads from way upstairs a year before Pearl Harbor.

The general public hasn't known much about the Bombardier, and hasn't realized that while a pilot flew a bombardier to within sight of a Jap battleship, the bombardier sunk the battleship. The bombardier even flies the plane while dropping his bombs!

That's why Brigadier General Eugene L. Eubank calls the bombardier "A new kind of American soldier... the most important of all our fighting men today."

General Eubank, who is director of bombardment of the Army Air Corps, then tells why the Bombardier is tops: wings and commissions, didn't like to have the bombardier say at the beginning of the target run, "Sir, you will now fly the ship." Col. Ryan and his cohorts fought for the Bombardier's rights and recognition. Training schools were founded for Bombardiers alone. Finally, the Bombardier cadets who had taken their 12-week instruction courses and were graduated, got commissions.

In the film "Bombardier" coming to the Arcade Theater August 29th, much of the early history of the bombardier is enacted by Pat O'Brien, Randolph Scott, Anne Shirley, Eddie Albert and a group of young actors headed by Walter Reed and Robert Ryan. The picture has many great Flying Fortresses, Consolidated Liberators, B-18's, and A T 11's—for it was filmed chiefly on locations at Army air fields such as Kirtland in New Mexico and Midland in Texas.

The movie people tell their story with its loves, comedy, drama, characterizations, personal adventure. But alongside this, moving unobtrusively because it is so much part of what is happening, is the accurate, Army-supervised record of how Bombardiers were born. It winds up spectacularly with a terrific pasting of industrial and military targets in Japan.

17-Year-Olds Wanted Naval Flight Training

Enlistment of qualified 17-year-old young men for future naval flight training has been resumed, and applications now are being received by the Naval Aviation Cadet Selection board, Seattle, information received today from the office of Lieut. C. W. Adams, officer in charge of the board for the thirteenth naval district, disclosed.

The program, which calls for college training before the enlistees begin their flight instructions, has been reopened with quotas considerably smaller than those prior to the closing down of enlistments July 1. Only high school graduates and young men who will be graduated not later than February 15, 1944, are eligible. Young men who have not been graduated can be enlisted now and will be placed on an inactive duty status until they receive their high school diplomas. Following their graduation from high school, these young men will be sent to college at navy expense and will receive up to one year of college training. Those who have completed their high school probably will be sent to college in the near future.

In order to qualify, a candidate must rank in the upper fifty percent of the male members of his

high school class scholastically and must have recommendations as to his moral character and general reputation. Parents consent is necessary for any young man to be enrolled in this program.

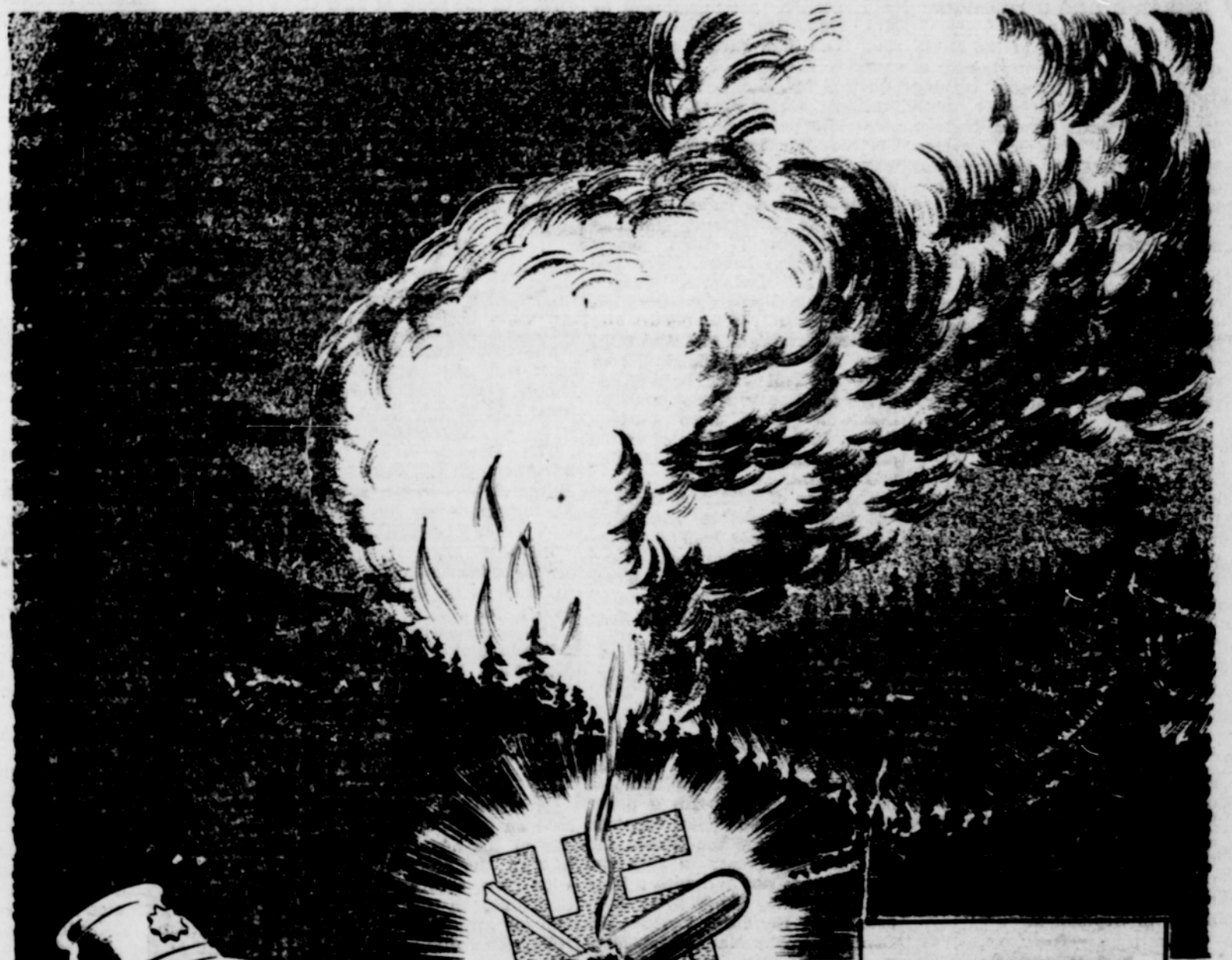
