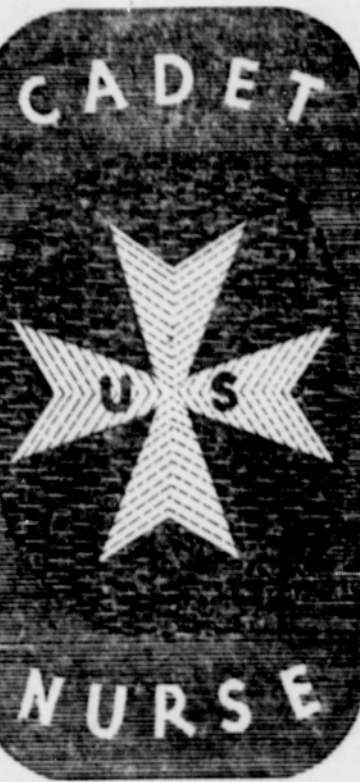

Ration Calendar

Gasoline:

In 17 states of eastern shortage area A-6 coupons are now valid. In states outside the eastern shortage area A-7 coupons are valid through September 21. B and C coupons expire according to dates on individual books. All gasoline coupons in the possession of car owners must be endorsed with the owner's license number and state of registration.

Fuel Oil:

Period 5 coupons in old rations remain valid through September 30. Period 1 coupons in new rations are valid now. Occupants of oil heated homes are urged to return their applications for next year's fuel oil to their Ration Boards promptly and when issued new rations to place orders with their dealers for summer fill-ups.

Sugar:

Stamp No. 14 good for five lbs. through October. Stamps Nos. 15 and 16 are good for 5 lbs. Each for home canning purposes through October 31. Housewives may apply to their local ration boards for more if necessary.

Shoes:

Stamp No. 18 (1 pair) is valid through October 31.

Stoves:

Consumer purchases of rationed stoves must be made with a certificate obtained at local war price and rationing boards.

Meat, Etc.:

Red Stamps T, U, V, and W valid through August 31. X valid through October 2. Y becomes valid August 29. Z becomes valid September 5, and both remain valid through October 2.

Processed Foods:

Blue Stamps R, S, and T remain valid through September 20. U, V, and W become valid September 1 and remain valid through October 20.

POST OFFICE TO MOVE SEPTEMBER 1

The Cottage Grove post office will move to its new quarters across the street from the present location on September 1st. The move will be really made on the evening of the 31st as business will be transacted as usual up to closing time in the present location on the afternoon of the 31st and will be open for business as usual the following morning at the new location (the building formerly occupied by the Gray Goose cafe). The new quarters which have been remodeled and redecorated and will take in the former quarters of the Square Deal Barber shop on 6th street, which will be used by the carriers.

ATTENDS THIRD WAR LOAN

Damon Scott, local war bond chairman, attended a meeting of the county committee at Eugene Tuesday noon and heard the purpose of the third war loan, starting September 9th explained by David Eccles, state executive manager. The purpose of the third loan is two fold, to finance the war and to fight inflation. Mr. Eccles told the committee. One third of the money needed for the prosecution of the war comes from taxes, the other two thirds must come from the American people he declared. Small investors, particularly farmers, must make larger purchases if inflation is to be avoided.
