## Sentinel Goes to Press

Through the courtesy of W. C. Martin, editor of the Cottage Grove Sentinel, the journalism class, 20 students in all, visited the Sentinel office and watched the Sentinel go to press Thursday, September 30. Al Shofstall demonstrated the linotype machine, and Wayne Monroe the making and preparing of pictures for the paper. The students were fascinated by the printing of the Sentinel on the Duplex web press, a large machine, holding 70 feet of paper in a roll and printing eight pages at a time. When the paper route through the press is completed the Sentinel is all folded and ready for mailing. Each metal form of type for one sheet of the paper weighs approximately 125 pounds. Twelve hundred or more copies are printed weekly, although the machine can print 3600 paper an hour. Miss Kem, the advisor, and Phyllis Foster, editor of school news to the Sentinel, were each presented with a metal slug bearing her name and official title. Many expressions of appreciation were voiced by the students after they returned to their journalism class, not only for the interesting and instructive hour they had spent, but for the kindness and hospitality of W. C. Martin, Al Shofstall, Wayne Monroe and Mrs. Adkins.

## Pacific Tel. & Tel. Releases Dividends

N. R. Powley, president of The Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company, in commenting on the company's affairs in connection with the release of dividend checks for the third quarter last week stated:

"The third quarter preliminary earnings statement indicates earnings of \$1.78 per common share, only a slight improvement over the \$1.69 per common share earned in the second quarter and compares with the \$1.56 per common share earned in the third quarter of last year. The earnings statement reflects federal taxes only at the 1942 rates and likewise does not reflect any portion of wage increases approximating \$6,000,000 annually which are now under negotiation with the unions, and which if accepted will require the approval of the war labor board.

"Due to the imperative telephone requirements of the essential war needs and the unavailability of materials for new construction and for the manufacture of new apparatus, the civilian telephone demands cannot, of necessity, be met in full. The shortage of telephone facilities is becoming more and more acute. Long distance lines, particularly between war activity centers, continue to be increasingly overcrowded due to the unprecedented volume of long distance traffic—the heaviest in the history of the company."

## First Accident of Hunting Season Reported Oct. 2nd

News of the first hunting tragedy in Southern Oregon was cleared Saturday evening through the telephone system of the Umpqua National forest. Charles Layton, 37, of Eagle Point, Jackson county, was accidentally shot by Orris Johnson, 22, while hunting near Butler Butte lookout station on the Rogue Umpqua divide, state police at Medford reported.

News of the tragedy was telephoned from the Butler Butte station over forest service lines to the coroner and police authorities at Medford.

Layton and Johnson were fellow employees of a lumber company at Prospect and were members of a large party which was conducting a drive while hunting deer along the divide. Johnson told police, according to the report from Medford, that he mistook Layton, father of five young children, all boys, for a deer and fired his shot from a distance of about 75 yards.—Roseburg News-Review.

## Brig. Gen. Rilea's Message to Guard

In the September issue of "On Guard," official publication of the Oregon State Guard there is a message from Brig. Gen. Rilea which may be of interest to every member of the 16th battalion. At the request of Lt. Gen. LaSells Stewart we are reproducing this message with the hope that it will be an inspiration to the men of the 16th battalion and many others.

"True to the 'spirit of service' imbued into the heart and mind of every man who had the privilege of serving in the old division under General White, I know the Oregon State Guard stands ready in case of any emergency, to render such aid, comfort or protection as you, and those serving under you, may be called upon to render. I am sure that I sense and feel the restless ambition which the men of the State Guard may have, in their desire to be in the front lines with us; they, like the 'fire-horses of old,' are no doubt 'champing at the bit,' but if they could only sense and feel equally with me, the response in thought and appreciation the men over here have with respect to the services which the State Guard stands ready to perform in aid of our homes and loved ones, the chest of every man associated with the State Guard would swell with pride and joy in the realization that a noble service is being rendered by them. If we, across the waters, were compelled to anxiety over the welfare and security of our homes, can you not realize how it would detract from our morale and ability to make needed sacrifices? And so I am extremely happy to advise you that condition does not exist among us. For every man in the uniform of the State Guard I can assure you, General, there are three men in the service overseas, who are most deeply appreciative. We are, and will continue to be, to a man, behind you."

"The boys from the northwest have done and are doing, a noble service in the cause of their country. My heart is kindled with pride at being one of them. Events have proved there can be no question of our victory. Time is always an uncertain factor, but we are undaunted in our determination for an early conclusion. In the meantime, it is the earnest hope and prayer of every man and boy comprising the old division that the State Guard will continue in its efforts and its service of an equally important cause. We salute you!"

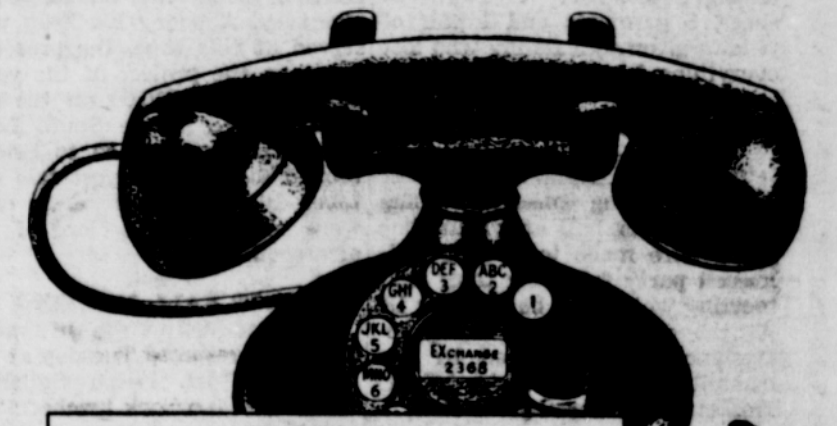
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
