Ration Calendar

Gasoline:

In 17 east coast states A-6 coupons are now good. In states outside the east coast area A-8 coupons are now good.

Fuel Oil:

Period 1 coupons are good through January 3.

Sugar:

Stamp No. 14 good for 5 pounds through October. Stamps Nos. 15 and 16 good for 5 pounds each for home canning through October 31.

Shoes:

Stamp No. 18 good for 1 pair. Validity has been extended indefinitely.

Meats, Fats:

Brown stamps C and D good through October 30. Brown Stamp E becomes good October 10 and remains good through October 30.

Processed Foods:

Blue Stamps U, V, and W expire October 20. Blue Stamps X, Y and Z are good through November 20.
