Gasoline:

In 17 east coast states A-6 coupons are now good. In states outside the east coast area A-8 coupons are now good.

Fuel Oil:

Period 1 coupons are good through January 3.

Sugar:

Stamp No. 14 good for 5 pounds through November 1. Stamp No. 29 in Book Four becomes good November 1, and will be good for 5 pounds through January 15, 1944. Stamps Nos. 15 and 16 good for 5 pounds each for home canning through October 31.

Shoes:

Stamp No. 18 good for one pair. Stamp No. 1 on the "Airplane" sheet in War Ration Book Three becomes good for one pair November 1.

Meats, Fats:

Brown stamps C, D, E, and F good through October 30. Brown stamps G, now good, expires December 4. Brown stamp H becomes good October 31 and remains good through December 4.
