

Forest Resources Of Oregon Listed In New Pamphlet

A comprehensive, detailed report on forest resources of Oregon has just been issued as a joint publication of the Oregon State Board of Forestry and the Oregon State college school of forestry entitled, "Forest Resources of Oregon."

This 64-page illustrated booklet constitutes a reference work on Oregon's forest wealth, present and potential, with material contributed by the two state agencies and by the Pacific Northwest Forest and Range Experiment station in Portland, operated by the U. S. Forest Service. It was compiled by Dean Paul M. Dunn of the school of forestry.

"The purpose of this publication is to make available to the citizens of Oregon the facts about forestry and the forest resources so important to the economy of the state," says Governor Earl Snell in a foreword. "With nearly half the total area of Oregon in timber, Oregonians should be acquainted with its composition and values."

The foreword also reveals that the mill value of lumber and allied industries in Oregon in 1942 was estimated at 227 million dollars, which, with an estimated 220 million dollars for the farm cash value of agricultural products in the same year, makes the two industries account for by far the largest proportion of the state's annual business.

The publication is divided into three parts, the first being prepared by the Pacific Northwest Forest and Range Experiment station at Portland and including reports on the character of Oregon's forests, forest area, sawtimber volume, individual tree species, forest depletion and forest growth. Part II, on management of the resources, includes chapters on development of forest industries and the development of forest policies and practices. The third section, on utilization of the resource, which was written by Dean Dunn, deals with sustained yield management, farm forestry, and the Oregon forest products laboratory.

While these booklets are not being distributed on a mass basis, individual copies may be had free by any citizen of Oregon requesting one, says Dean Dunn.

Roland Conklin was home from Camp Adair to spend Christmas with his family.

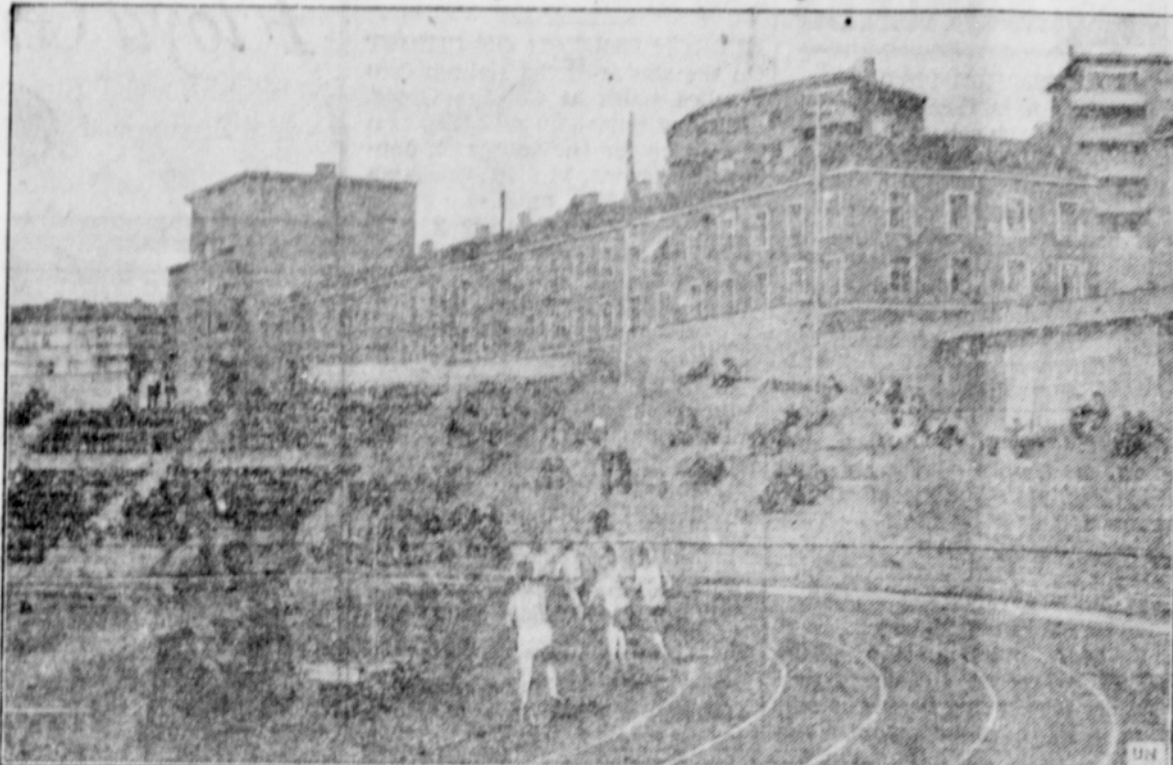

As the handful of spectators in German uniforms testify, the stadium seats 30,000 persons. For three years the 300,000 members of the Norwegian Athletic Union have flatly refused to take part in Nazi-staged events. Many of them, including the world's champion ski-jumper Birger Ruud, are in concentration camps as a result.

Oakland Flier Walks Away from Wrecked Plane; Escapes France

First Lieutenant Wayne S. Rader, who not only walked away from the wreck of his Flying Fortress, but also succeeded in getting back to England after being shot down over France, is visiting at Oakland, Oregon, with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Oscar Rader.

Survivor of the LeBorget Taid August 16, 1943, Rader's experience reads like a fiction tale.

The plane on which he was serving as a bombardier was struck by ack-ack fire and was so badly damaged that the crew was given orders to jump. All leaped except Rader and the co-pilot, who were trapped in the nose of the ship. The huge four-motored plane began spinning earthward at a terrific speed and there seemed no hope for the two trapped men, when there was a sudden explosion and the plane flew apart, throwing the two crew members clear of the wreckage.

Rader as knocked temporarily unconscious by the force of the explosion, but recovered consciousness in time to pull the rip cord of his parachute. He descended safely but could find no trace of the co-pilot or other members of the crew, although he later contacted the co-pilot and the two were together during the period of their escape.

Rader received treatment for a badly torn and mangled hand, injured in the explosion. Details of his escape cannot be revealed until after the war, but he managed to return to his base in England about two months after his unique experience.

The other members of the crew, aside from the co-pilot, are believed to be held in Germany.—Roseburg News-Review.

BOND SELLING COST LOW

The American public is being libeled by misinformation concerning the cost of selling war bonds and the rate at which war bonds are being cashed in. This is the conclusion of Kenneth G. Martin, district representative of the Oregon war finance committee, who reported this week to John R. Snellstrom, Lane county chairman, Martin has just returned from a conference of U. S. Treasury executives where plans were made for the 4th war loan scheduled for January.

The out-of-pocket cost of selling war bonds is 1/33 of 1 percent, Martin reported. This unusually low cost of selling bonds is in contrast with cost of 2 percent in the sale of similar war bonds by other allied nations.

"Rumors about the high cost of selling war bonds can be laid to ignorance or enemy propaganda," J. R. Snellstrom, Lane county chairman stated yesterday. "Only in America could billions of dollars be raised at such unusually low cost."

Figures released by the state office show that Lane county has invested \$7,958,335.25 in Series E war bonds since May, 1942. While the exact percentage of redemptions in this county could not be ascertained, J. R. Snellstrom asserted that the figure is proportionately low.
