Stamp No. 18 in book one is good for 1 pair. Stamp No. 1 on the "Airplane sheet in book three is good for 1 pair.

Fuel Oil:

Period 2 coupons are good in all regions through February 7. Period 3 coupons are good through March 13 in all areas except the south.

Meats, Fats:

Brown stamps R and S are good through January 29. Brown stamp T becomes processed foods—green stamps D, E, and F in book four are good through January 20.

Timely Recipes

A favorite recipe for using sour milk is Southern Spoon Bread. This must be served with a spoon (hence the name) and eaten with a fork. A bit of butter should be melted over each serving. Try this as a hot bread for a Sunday breakfast. Or if you have just a small amount of sour milk these molasses muffins are delicious.

Southern Spoon Bread

2 eggs beaten lightly
2 cups sour milk
2 cups water
1 cup cornmeal
1 1/2 tsp salt
2 tsp butter
1 tsp salt

Mix thoroughly, bake in a moderate oven 50-65 minutes until set.

Molasses Muffins

2 cups sifted all-purpose flour
1 tsp baking powder
1/2 tsp salt
1/2 tsp baking soda
2 tsp granulated sugar
1 egg, beaten
1/2 cup molasses
1/2 cup sour milk
2 tsp melted butter

Sift together dry ingredients. Combine egg, molasses, milk, and butter and add to flour mixture, stirring only until dry ingredients are moistened. Fill buttered muffin tins two-thirds full. Bake in moderately hot oven of 400 degrees for 35 minutes. Makes 15 muffins.

TRAFFIC DEATH TOLL FOR 1943 REVEALS DECREASE
CHICAGO.—The nation's traffic death toll for 1943 was estimated at 23,000 by the National Safety Council Thursday, a drop of 20 per cent from 1941.

The figure, the council said, represents a saving of 5,000 lives over last year and almost 17,000 over 1941. It was based on an actual figure of 20,480 deaths for the first 11 months of 1943 and a projection of the figure for December.
