ITEMS NO LONGER RATIONED

Pressure cookers and feed grinders and crushers have been removed from rationing. Because the supply of pressure cookers will not meet all uses, the approval of the War Food Administration is necessary for purchases of pressure cookers for other than food preservation uses. Applications should be made to the Director, Office of Materials and Facilities, War Food Administration, Washington, D. C.

SUGAR RATION REMAINS SAME

Sugar rations for home use will remain the same for another two and one-half months, according to the Office of Price Administration. Sugar stamp number 30 in War Ration Book Four becomes valid on January 16, and will be good for buying five pounds of sugar through the end of March. Sugar stamp 29, now in use, is good through January 15.

Use Glass
Scarcities of tin-cans have thrown a burden on the glass-container industry. Demand for glass containers is about 20 per cent greater than the supply.

SPARE STAMP NO. 2 GOOD FOR FIVE POINTS OF PORK

WASHINGTON—Pork eaters received a new war-ration bonus Monday from the OPA.

OPA ruled that spare stamp No. 2 on No. 4 ration book is good for the purchase of five points worth of fresh pork and sausage until January 15. The stamp will not be good for buying smoked or cured pork.

TO SELL SOME SHOES RATION-FREE

Some women's footwear, mostly novelty types, will be sold ration-free at \$3 or less a pair from January 17 through January 29. This does not mean that the shoe supply picture has improved. It is intended to help dealers dispose of limited quantities of wearable shoes which have been lying on the shelves.

Tracer Bullets
