Agriculture Board Hits Subsidy Plan

The state board of agriculture went on record to consumer subsidies in its regular semi-annual meeting in Salem in December when it endorsed in detail a letter written by E. L. Peterson, state director of agriculture, to the chairman of the U. S. senate agriculture committee, who had invited Peterson to appear in Washington, D. C., at a hearing on subsidies and farm prices. Peterson sent the letter in lieu of appearing.

The board, through its endorsement of the Peterson letter, declared that farmers are already struggling with a maze of federal regulations and that they sincerely fear further federal domination and encroachment. Here are other brief excerpts from the three-page letter:

"Federal programs have repeatedly called attention to the large volume of purchasing power of which the percentage used for food is at as low a point as at any time in our history. Farmers, therefore, believe subsidies unnecessary.

"The belief in agricultural circles is that subsidies will not act either to sustain production or to increase it. Farm production schedules are not flexible. The uncertainty of the duration of subsidies and their amount does not appeal to farmers.

"The subjection of subsidies upon producers in lieu of fair prices thus places them at the mercy of federal agents.

"Farmers view subsidies as purely for benefit of consumer. Wage earners have the full support of the government to secure fair wages. Their work week is still 48 hours, while the farmer's work week averages nearly 70 hours. Most farmers have no desire to deny wage earners their gains but believe that wage earners (consumers) should realize that farmers should likewise have fair wages (prices), and not be dependent upon the beneficence of government.

LIBRARY REPORT FOR DECEMBER

The library report released by Mrs. Dan Hamant, librarian, for the month of December shows 613 adult fictions loaned and 109 non-fictions, making a total of 722 books loaned during December to adults. 133 children's fictions were loaned and 108 non-fictions, making a total of 241 children's books loaned during the month.

Money received from fines was \$9.59 and from the rental shelf, \$9.25, making a total of \$18.84 received during December. There were 113 new books purchased for the library and 3 books discarded.

During December there were 23 borrowers cards issued and 10 cards cancelled. At present, the total number of borrowers is 1639.

Import Labor

Nearly 60,000 Mexicans, Jamaicans and Bahamians have come into the United States this year to work on the farms. Several thousand of the Jamaicans and Bahamians are at work in New York fields and orchards.

CHICKEN LESS OFTEN

Chicken soon will appear less often on home, restaurant and hotel menus as a substitute for rationed meats.

The War Food administration Thursday night ordered cold storage stocks of chickens set aside for the armed services, military hospitals, the war shipping administration and other agencies buying for government account.

The freeze order covered all stocks in excess of 3,000 pounds held by dealers, restaurant and hotel operators, processors, wholesalers, retailers and other holders of frozen chickens. Owners of poultry held in individual family locker spaces were specifically exempted from the order.

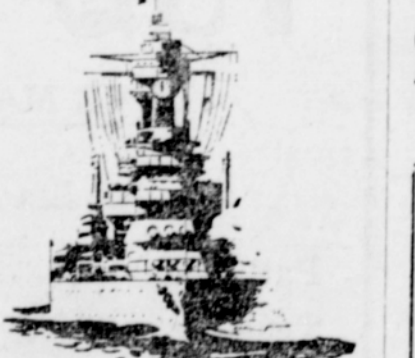
Caulking Saves Fuel

Net Farm Income For Next Season May Be Smaller

It is not probable that net farm income next year will be as great as for the current 1943-44 marketing season, according to a review of the outlook for agriculture in Oregon in 1944 and beyond, just published by the agricultural extension service at Oregon State college to assist farmers on production and marketing problems. The circular contains sections on the farm price and cost situation, the demand and price outlook, probable trend of farm costs, and other related information.

Even if gross farm income should be as great next marketing season as this the net income probably will be less, according to the extension service report, as there are indications that costs probably will be higher in relation to prices for farm products. Much will depend upon the duration of the war and, if it should end within the year, the adequacy of whatever governmental measures are taken to soften the fall of farm prices afterward.

Farm prices in Oregon now average 84 per cent above 1933-1939 levels and 122 per cent above 1930-1934. The United States general average is 26 per cent above the current '30 per cent of parity' level, the basis generally discussed for post-war price supports.

The eight-page review contains several charts and tables of data bearing on the outlook for agriculture in Oregon. These include data on current levels of production, consumer purchasing power,

where the food is going, farm commodity prices, production costs and land values, employment and wage rates, income available for family living, and the cost of living.

The pattern and trend of Oregon's agricultural industry is illustrated by a new chart showing Oregon's cash farm income by major sources in 1926-1930, 1935-1939, and in 1942. A copy of the complete report may be obtained free from county extension offices.

CHANGES IN STOVE RATIONING

Eligibility requirements for rationed stoves have been widened. A consumer who has a heating or cooking stove that cannot be used satisfactorily is now eligible for a stove-rationing certificate. Ration certificates also may be issued for stoves to heat premises where essential community activities, such as volunteer Red Cross work, are carried on. A ration certificate now may be issued to a landlord who wishes to buy a stove for the use of an eligible tenant.

TO GET MORE CHILDREN'S WEAR

To insure sufficient production of infants and children's wear, the industry has been included by the War Manpower Commission in its list of essential activities. Also, WPB has ordered approximately 18 million yards of cotton fabrics set aside for the manufacture of certain specified items of infants' and children's clothing. Worsteds and cotton yarn will be allocated for manufacture of knitted outerwear and infants' ribbed long hose, half socks, and anklets. Such goods will not arrive on retail counters until February and March.

RATION TOKENS FOR RETAILERS

Retailers selling rationed foods should file their applications for

ration tokens by Saturday, January 8, to be sure of having a supply when the token plan starts February 27, OPA says. The application form is being distributed to retailers by trade associations and also is available at local rationing boards.
