### GASOLINE:

In 17 East Coast States A-8 coupons are good through February 8. In States outside the East Coast Area A-9 coupons are good through January 21.

### SUGAR:

Stamp No. 29 in Book Four is good for 5 pounds through January 15. Stamp No. 30 becomes good January 16 and will be good for 5 pounds through March 31.

### SHOES:

Stamp No. 18 in Book One is good for one pair. Stamp No. 1 on The Airplane sheet in Book Three is good for one pair.

### FUEL OIL:

Period 2 coupons are good through February 7 in all areas except the south, where they are good through January 24. Period 3 coupons, now valid in the middle west, south, east, and far west, remain good through March 13 in the middle west, east, and far west, and through February 21 in the South.

### MEATS, FATS:

Brown Stamps R, S, and T are good through January 29. Brown Stamp U becomes good January 16 and remains good through January 29. Spare Stamp 2 in Book Four is good for 5 points worth of fresh pork and all sausage through January 15.

### PROCESSED FOODS:

Green Stamps D, E, F in Book Four are good through January 20. Green Stamps G, H, and J in Book Four are good through February 20.
