

### Small Hen House Confines Birds Neighbors Cheer

Want to keep a few chickens in the backyard and still keep good neighbors? Perhaps the way to do this may be found in a new extension bulletin from Oregon State college that describes the construction and use of an 8 x 12 foot, 25-hen poultry house equipped with a portable wire porch which makes it possible to keep a few hens satisfactorily under confinement. Hens penned up won't be scratching the neighbor's victory garden.

Laying hens need not run out on the ground, explains James A. Harper, research assistant in poultry husbandry, who, with Clyde Walker, extension agricultural engineer, is author of the bulletin. Pullets may be grown to maturity in the confinement of the house when given free access to the outside porch and if provided with a well balanced diet, as they cannot forage for extra feed. The wire porch provides additional space, prevents disease due to contaminated soil and permits the birds to get fresh air and sunshine.

One caution suggested before anyone embarks on one of these back yard poultry projects is to investigate feed supplies, which have been critically short. It will be advisable to contact a feed store, mill or dealer with regard to assurance of normal supplies of mash and grain before any poultry house is constructed or stock purchased, the authors say.

The bulletin was issued in response to the widespread interest in home food production in time of war. The restrictions on poultry keeping in the backyards of urban homes have been modified by many cities for the duration and home table poultry flocks are being established in increasing numbers.

This new illustrated bulletin discusses three ways of starting such an enterprise, tells how to construct a small poultry house, and explains how such a building can be divided with a partition so as to use half of it for brooding purposes and the other half as a laying house. A free copy of this bulletin, No. 625, can be had from any county extension office, or direct from the college.

### Spiced Tomato Juice

### WAR CASUALTIES PASS 139,809

American casualties since the start of the war now total more than 139,809, the army losses total 105,229 and those of the navy, marine and coast guard 34,523.

Secretary of war Stimson, in reporting the army casualties from the start of the war to December 23, said the figure represented 16,831 killed, 38,916 wounded, 24,067 missing and 25,415 prisoners of war.

Casualties to American elements of the fifth army in Italy since the start of that campaign in September are 18,119. Of this total 2798 were killed, 11,762 were wounded and 3559 were missing. The navy-marine-coast guard casualties reported up to today are made up as follows: 15,186 killed, 6616 wounded, 8429 missing, 4292 prisoners of war.

The Cottage Grove Lions annexed their initial hoop victory of the current campaign when they scored a 32-29 decision over the Uni High Tigers Friday night January 14, on the opposition's home court. The win put the Lions back in the midst of the league race as they have lost only one previous game to the strong Eugene Hi Axemen.

Coach Curtis French opened the game with the second string which he used for half the first quarter before sending in his first team. Dick Hardisty broke the ice for the Tigers after about two minutes of play when he sank a long one hander from mid-floor. Sargent followed with a lay-in to give Uni Hi a 4-0 lead. Gerry Witherspoon made the first local score when he sank a free throw. Doc Wickendoll scored the first Lion fielder after Lawson had connected for the Tide. At this point French sent in his first team which succeeded in gaining an 8-8 quarter score.

Points were matched during the second period until Martin, Tide substitute canned a fielder to give Uni Hi a 15-14 half-time advantage.

The end of the third period saw the Lions in a one point lead which they never relinquished. During the final canto the Lions moved into a three point lead when Harpole and Edwards scored. O'Hearn then cantered for the Tide but in vain as Land repeated the feat for the Grove. Edwards sank all Tide hope when he canned a free toss to end the scoring.

Howard Harpole, Lions ace center copped scoring honors for the evening, connecting for four fielders and five free-throw for a 13 point total. Sargent led the losers with 11 counters.

Leonard Barkemeyer lead the Grove yearlings to a 39-28 verdict over the Tide "B" string when he accounted for four points.
