

FRUIT SPREADS ALLOCATED

Seasonally increasing quantities of commercial jams, jellies, marmalade, and fruit butter, produced from fruits harvested last summer and fall, are now reaching the civilian market, according to the WFA. It is estimated that civilians will have consumed or have in their possession 416 million pounds of these fruit spreads during the current pack year which ends next June. This is about 69 per cent of the approximate total supply.
