PUBLIC WASTING MONEY ON VITAMIN PILLS, TABLETS, CAPSULES, LIQUIDS

The current very active campaign of misleading advertising in magazines and newspapers and on the radio for vitamin and mineral preparations makes a very timely comment.

The current "vitamin racket" is reminiscent of patent medicine days and flourishes as a result of misconceptions regarding the prevalence of vitamin deficiencies. Misleading advertising has made the public believe that a half to two-thirds of the entire population is malnourished.

The use and abuse of vitamins simmers down to whether there is any need for them in the specific case in question. If one is weak, tired and fatigued readily the person believes he is one of the two-thirds of the population that is not properly nourished. That may be the case, but it also may not be so. The result, unfortunately, is a tremendous misuse of valuable and expensive material. In most cases a more intelligent approach would be to improve one's selection of food—that is if nutrition is at fault.

Vitamins are only part of nutrition and there is no evidence that man will have less fatigue, experience any fewer colds, or have more general resistance to disease by consuming "extra" amounts of the various vitamins.

Good nutrition comes from a wide choice and a wide variety of wholesome food, not from a poor diet supplemented with vitamin and mineral preparations.

Water Compost

To assist the rotting of a compost heap, water it enough to keep it damp clear through and add to each layer of plant waste fresh animal and poultry manures, or a few handfuls of a complete fertilizer high in nitrogen, cottonseed meal, or similar nitrogen-containing plant food. The soil in the compost heap absorbs the products of the decayed vegetable matter, prevents loss, and makes the compost convenient to handle.

PORK FROM FARM SLAUGHTERERS

Twelve Red Stamps in Book Four, which are numbered "S" and lettered from "A" through "M", may be used for buying pork and other rationed meats from farm slaughterers. These stamps will not be used by consumers in general until February 27. They will have the same expiration dates for purchases from farmers as in city markets. The stamps are worth 10 points each, making a total value of 120 points. This does not give the individual who buys from a farm slaughterer a larger meat ration than anyone else. It merely allows him to buy a fairly large amount at one time.
