

Farm Machinery Outlook in 1944 Somewhat Better

Oregon's 1944 farm machinery situation, while not so favorable as indicated by early reports, still is considerably improved over last year, N. C. Donaldson, executive assistant for the AAA committee, reports.

The amount of new machinery allocated the state, while short of demand for most items, is from 20 to 80 per cent larger than last year for many items, Donaldson pointed out. More important, he believes, are indications that manufacturers have already made or will produce all of the machinery authorized, and that it will be delivered in time for seasonal use.

A group of representative manufacturers, recently reported to the War Food administration that they were well along on production schedules, and that the schedules would be completed by June 30th. This contrasts sharply with the situation a year ago, when many manufacturers had not yet started production. Considerable amounts of 1944 machinery already have arrived in the state, and deliveries are increasing.

Quotas to counties for the 18 types of new machinery in schedule I of the rationing program are based on 80 per cent of the authorized output, the AAA officer said. These quotas, which follow distribution plans drawn by manufacturers, have several possibilities for being increased. Machinery authorized under the 1943 program but not delivered until this year will be added. An example of this is the recent allocation to the state by one manufacturer of 29 side delivery rakes and 43 hay loaders made under the 1943 program, resulting in increased quotas for the counties specified by the manufacturer.

Allocations to the state from the 20 per cent reserve also will result in increased county quotas. The state committee has requested substantial supplemental allocations from the reserve of labor-saving types of haying and potato machinery.

Two manufacturers have been authorized to produce additional amounts of tractors and mowers, to take care of any possible deficit in output of other plants because of difficulty in obtaining component parts, such as bearings and ignition systems. Oregon will receive 360 of these "insurance" tractors. If all of the regular allocation is received, these will be in addition to present quotas, and will bring the state's total 1944 allocation to 1470 tractors. This total does not include possible allocations from the 20 per cent reserve.

PRODUCTION UTMIMUM GIVEN FARM WORKERS

Selective service served notice Thursday on the 1,700,000 farm workers who have been deferred from military service that if their individual production does not add substantially to the nation's food supply their deferments may be cancelled.

Commander Patrick H. Winston, assistant executive, National Selective service headquarters, said here that farm workers may be called upon in the near future to increase sharply their production goals or be taken into the armed services.

Farm Seed Loans Are Now Available

During 1943 American farmers were called on for the greatest production in the history of our country. Needless to say, the response was wholehearted and an all-time high in farm products was the result. The emergency crop and feed loan division of the farm credit administration was called upon to aid the food for victory program through the extension of credit to farmers who did not have the necessary cash and who were unable to finance their crop production and livestock feeding through regular credit channels. The need for intensified farm production is as great in 1944 as in 1943.

V. N. Freeman, field supervisor for southwestern Oregon, announces that crop and feed loans are available under the same terms as last year.

Loans are made for the purpose of buying seed and fertilizer, and to meet other expenses incident to crop production including repairs to machinery and equipment. Funds may be also used for the purchase or raising of feed for livestock. Security for these loans is a first lien on the crops to be financed or the livestock to be fed. The maximum amount of any individual loan is \$400 and the rate of interest is 4 per cent per annum. Loan checks are usually delivered within 10 days after the application is completed. "The fact that an applicant owes balances on old crop or feed loans will not in itself prevent approval of a new loan provided the reason for non-payment was beyond his control," Mr. Freeman said.
