GASOLINE:

In states outside the East Coast Area A-10 coupons are good thru March 21.

TIRE INSPECTION:

Deadline for A coupon holders is March 31. For B and C coupon holders, deadline is February 28.

SUGAR:

Stamp No. 30 in Book Four is good for 5 pounds through March 31. Stamp No. 40 in Book Four is good for five pounds of canning sugar through February 28, 1945.

SHOES:

Stamp No. 18 in Book One is good for one pair. Stamp No. 1 on The Airplane sheet in Book Three is good for one pair.

FUEL OIL:

Period 2 coupons are good through February 7 in all areas except in the south. Period 3 coupons, now valid in the middle west, south, east, and far west, remain good through March 13 in the middle west, east, and far west, and through February 21 in the South.

MEATS, FATS:

Brown Stamps V and W good through February 26.

PROCESSED FOODS:

Green Stamps G, H, and J in Book Four are good through February 20. Green Stamps K, L and M are good through March 20.

Deadline for filing returns, March 15, earlier filing is desirable.
