

Support Prices For Many Crops Proposed by WFA

The War Food administration has announced proposed 1944 support prices on several additional farm products of importance in Oregon's food for victory campaign, according to information received by the agricultural extension service at Oregon State college. The announcement indicates that further details will be given out after adequate provisions have been made for making the support price program effective.

The proposed support for smooth dry edible peas of the varietal types, Alaska, bluebell, scotch green, first and best, marrowfat, and white Canada, is \$5.65 a hundred for U. S. No. 1 grade and \$5.40 for No. 2, in carlots pursuant to procedures yet to be announced. Dry edible beans and flaxseed are also included.

The program for giving further support to peas for canning thru the purchase of dry wrinkled peas of the varietal types, alderman, perfection, profusion, surprise, and Thomas Laxton, are to be announced in the near future, the War Food administration states.

The proposed support price for late potatoes is 90 per cent of parity calculated as of July 1, 1944, effective at the shipping point level on potatoes graded, sacked, and loaded f.o.b. cars. Specific schedules are to be announced later.

In addition to the price supports for winter cover crop seeds previously announced, it is proposed to support prices for certain hay and pasture seeds thru nonrecourse loans on a basis yet to be announced. The purchase program for six varieties of vegetable seeds (beet, cabbage, carrot, onion, turnip, and rutabaga) previously announced, may be extended to others if needed. Non-recourse loans on barley and rye, similar to the program for wheat and corn, are also proposed. The rate indicated for barley in Oregon is 90 cents a bushel for No. 1 stored on farms or in warehouses, subject to certain provisions.

It is proposed to assure farmers \$3 a ton for sugar beets over the price received in 1942 for beets of standard quality delivered at designated points.

Among the price supports yet to be announced are those for snap beans, sweet corn, green peas, tomatoes, beets, carrots, lima beans, and spinach for processing; for pears and peaches for canning; and for dried apples, apricots, peaches, pears, prunes, and raisins. Detailed announcements concerning these programs are to be made prior to the beginning of the respective marketing season for these commodities.

No support price for 1944 crop vegetables grown for the fresh market is planned, but assistance is to be extended through marketing and distribution measures.

LABOR NEEDS OF AGRICULTURE

The largest single increase in total labor requirements is the seasonal demand in agriculture, according to a recent War Manpower commission survey of the nation's manpower needs for the first half of 1944. Between January and July about 3.4 million persons will be needed for farm employment. The bulk of this labor will be supplied by women and young persons.

Shipyard Absenteeism

Absences from work from November, 1942, through June, 1943, ran from 10.3 to 7.0 per cent in the larger maritime yards having over 2,500 workers. Current surveys indicate that at least one-third of the absences in maritime shipyards have to do with health and accidents. The shipyards where inexcusable days off are fewest, are those where plant and union committees keep close tabs on lost days, and where leaders are made responsible for the attendance of their crews.
