Feed Growing to Be Encouraged in 1944 AAA Program

The 1944 AAA program offers Oregon dairy farmers maximum assistance in improving pastures and growing more high protein forage to help offset scarcity of protein concentrates, points out John Shepherd of Seio, member of the state AAA committee.

Elimination of the farm allowance provisions in effect gives each farm an unlimited soil building allowance, except for application of lime and phosphate, Shepherd said. The allowance for lime and phosphate recently has been set at \$2 an acre of cropland and orchard. These liberal provisions will afford many dairy operators an opportunity to perform much more soil-building work than was possible under the allowance limitations of the previous programs.

Production practices offer payment for application of lime and phosphate, and both materials are again available through the conservation materials program. Increased supplies of phosphate are available if farmers place orders now with their county AAA committee, Shepherd reported, pointing out that phosphate is effective in many areas in increasing growth of legumes such as clovers and alfalfa.

Other 1944 practices designed to increase productivity of pastures include construction of drainage ditches, tile drainage, control of destructive plants and noxious weeds, reseeding depleted pastures and meadows, pasture improvement, mowing weeds and rodent control.

Payment rates and information on these and other 1944 practices can be obtained from county AAA offices and community committees, Shepherd said.

SENSE OF TOUCH

BOUGAINVILLE. — Correct Bougainville foxhole digging requires a keen judge of depth.

If you dig too shallow, you expose yourself to bombs. If you dig too deep, you strike water.

THE EFFECT OF TOBACCO ON HEALTH

(Dr. H. A. Hagen.)

(Continued from last week.)

In America, from all sides come reports of the increasing incidence of peptic ulcer since the beginning of the war, coincident with the increase in consumption of tobacco.

The problem has attracted many investigators. Major Cramp-ton of the United States Army began with a statement that "Cigarette consumption has more than doubled in the U. S. during the first world war, rising from 25 billion to 53 billion annually. The increase in the consumption of the weed in the army, he points out, was nearly three times as great as in the general population.

"Since that time," he continues, "cigarette smoking has increased enormously and in the last four months of 1941 there was a twelve per cent increase over the corresponding months of 1940."

Small wonder then that the suspicion of a major part in the etiology of peptic and duodenal ulcer falls upon tobacco. "It," (the weed) says an authority, "is admitted to affect the circulation especially the vaso-motor tone of the arteries, veins and capillaries."

"The effect," says another, "of tobacco on secretion in conjunction with its effect on the vascular system justly places it under suspicion as a factor in the cause and chronicity of ulcers." And still again, "Tobacco in an ulcer susceptible individual appears to be a constant factor in the cause of ulcer and is a major influence in the prevention of healing and the recurrence of the lesion."

One does not wish to be a kill-joy or to become fanatic over this question, yet it would appear from the above that the generous giving away of great quantities of cigarettes to the troops, now so popular, may be really doing them a serious dis-service and one may, surely, urge in the light of the evidence that to distribute a substance productive of peptic ulcer may not after all be a proper method of maintaining morale.

The wholesale consumption of tobacco may also have been a factor in the disease "trench foot" which plagued the soldiers of the last war and is appearing in this. Now, this disease, although said to be brought on by cold plus the inability to change footwear often enough, certainly develops lesions similar to those alterations in the vascular system which are produced by tobacco. "The smaller arteries are at first contracted and later the larger deeper vessels and gangrene is often the result."

"It is general knowledge," says another researcher, writing in the Journal of the A. M. A., "that continued smoking is associated with progressive circulatory deficiency in spite of the application of all known medical aids." And again, "Whether or not an actual causal relation between tobacco and thrombo-angiitis obliterans can be established, it is absolutely essential to abstain from tobacco, as it is the primary aim in any case of vascular deficiency to maintain a proper flow of blood to support the metabolic processes in the diseased member. . . . One might as well say 'Your cigarettes or your legs' and refuse to treat any patient with thrombo-angiitis obliterans who continues to smoke."

It may be urged that nothing in reason should be denied those who go forth into the horror of modern battle. We should be the last to deny it. But, the facts remain. The action of tobacco on the nervous system of all too many men any women is definitely poisonous and they should know it.
